Writes French Don't Know Yankee Appetites

The French cooks don't understand the American appetite, according to a letter received by Harry Telford from his brother, Wilbur, who is in France with the 20th Engineers. Mr. Telford says the French are good cooks, and everything that they serve tastes good, but that they have trouble in getting them to cook enough.

The letter, in part, follows:

"You can get pretty good eats in most of the French points, but they always serve things in courses. They will only bring in one thing at a time, and wait till that is eaten before they bring on the next. It takes about an hour and a half to two hours to get a good square meal in France. In lots of the smaller towns you eat in the kitchen, and they cook one thing while you are eating the one before. In some restaurants we got into they did not have any stove, doing all the cooking over an open fire. However, they are all good cooks, and everything they serve tastes good. We have a little trouble in getting them to cook enough. They can't seem to get used to American appetites.

"Well, I seem to be getting somewhat off the track, so will return to my trip. We left said city, and went on to our destination, which was some docks near another pretty good sized town, where they unload lots of cars, trucks and other supplies. The town there is one of the oldest in France, and was sure worth looking over. All their buildings in this country are built fairly solid. Usually with stone walls two or three feet thick. This town, however, was even more substantial looking than usual. The first

morning there we set up some Dodge cars (delivery wagons), and the next day most of the bunch took these and started back. Three of us and two from another outfit stayed over a couple of days longer and got two 5 1/2 ton "Mack" trucks. We had a fine trip home in them, being three days and a half on the road. Their speed limit is only ten miles per. So had plenty of time to see the country. The part of France we came thru is sure a pretty country, and for roads, well, California sure has nothing on France. They are some roads, and they keep every little hole filled up. I would sure like to get hold of a good car for a few days with nothing to do but drive on them.

"I never saw prettier country than most of what we came thru; most of the first two-thirds of our trip we followed fairly close along a bay or river. The country was slightly rolling, and covered as far as you could see in every direction with vineyards, dotted here and there with the white stone houses of the French people, and with occasionally the gray remains of some old tower or castle, in some cases almost entirely fallen down, while others stand almost as good as new. In one little town where we stopped for dinner, a Frenchman took us thru an old church, which, if we understood him right, was built some time before the year 1000. They are still using the church, and I suppose will continue to use it as long as France is France."

Many of these are being constructed for shipment to General Pershing's forces. It contains a steam boiler into which clothing will be placed under high pressure. All dirt will be removed in forty minutes. If necessary the machines may be sent up to the trenches.
