Liberty Loan Reports Far From Encouraging

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19.—The third Liberty Loan campaign is two-fifths over and just one-third of the three-billion minimum has been officially recorded as subscribed.

"Sales since the first day of the campaign, when they started with a rush, frankly are not up to the expectations," said the treasury's daily review. "There is a feeling of disappointment, particularly in the large cities. The country districts are doing better than they did in previous campaigns, but the gains that they are making are not of sufficient size to offset the lack of sales in the larger communities."

FACTORY DESTROYED BY FIRE

CHEHALIS, April 19.—The factory of the Chehalis Furniture and Manufacturing company has been destroyed by fire. It is believed to be of incendiary origin. The loss is estimated at \$110,000.

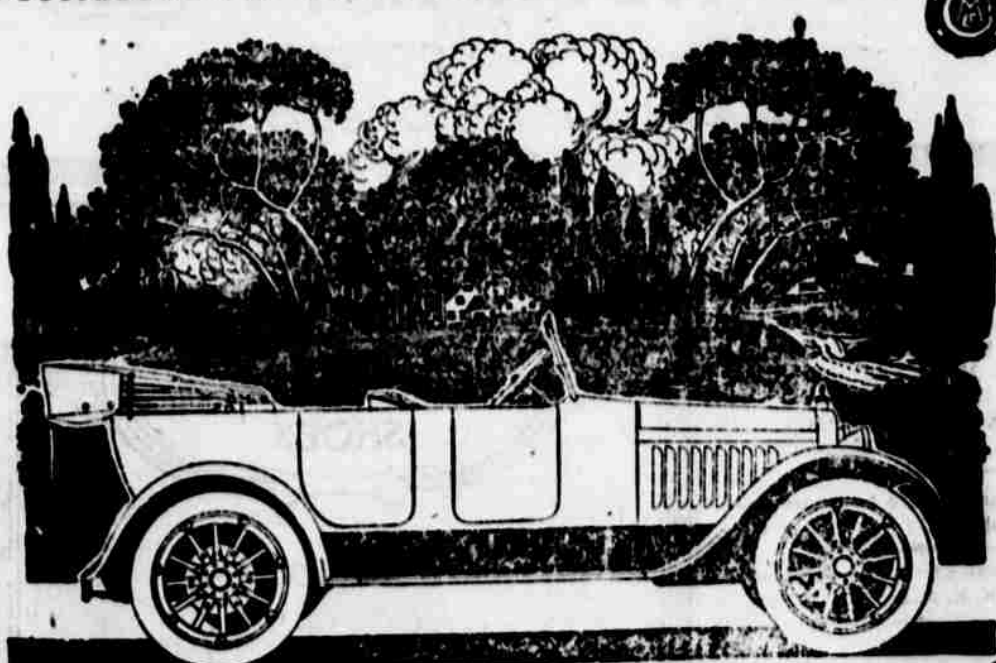
