Two New French Guns Used in Great Battle on West Front



These photographs of new French guns have just arrived in the United States, and the information came with them that the weapons had been completed in time to be used in the great battle now raging on the western front. The larger gun, that of 240 millimetres in diameter, about 9 1/2 inches, must be shot from a specially designed iron platform. The other gun, that of 145 millimetres, about 5.7 inches, is mounted on a carriage, which is drawn on heavy rubber-tired wheels. These are some of the new French artillery, it is believed, which has been used in halting the great German drive.
