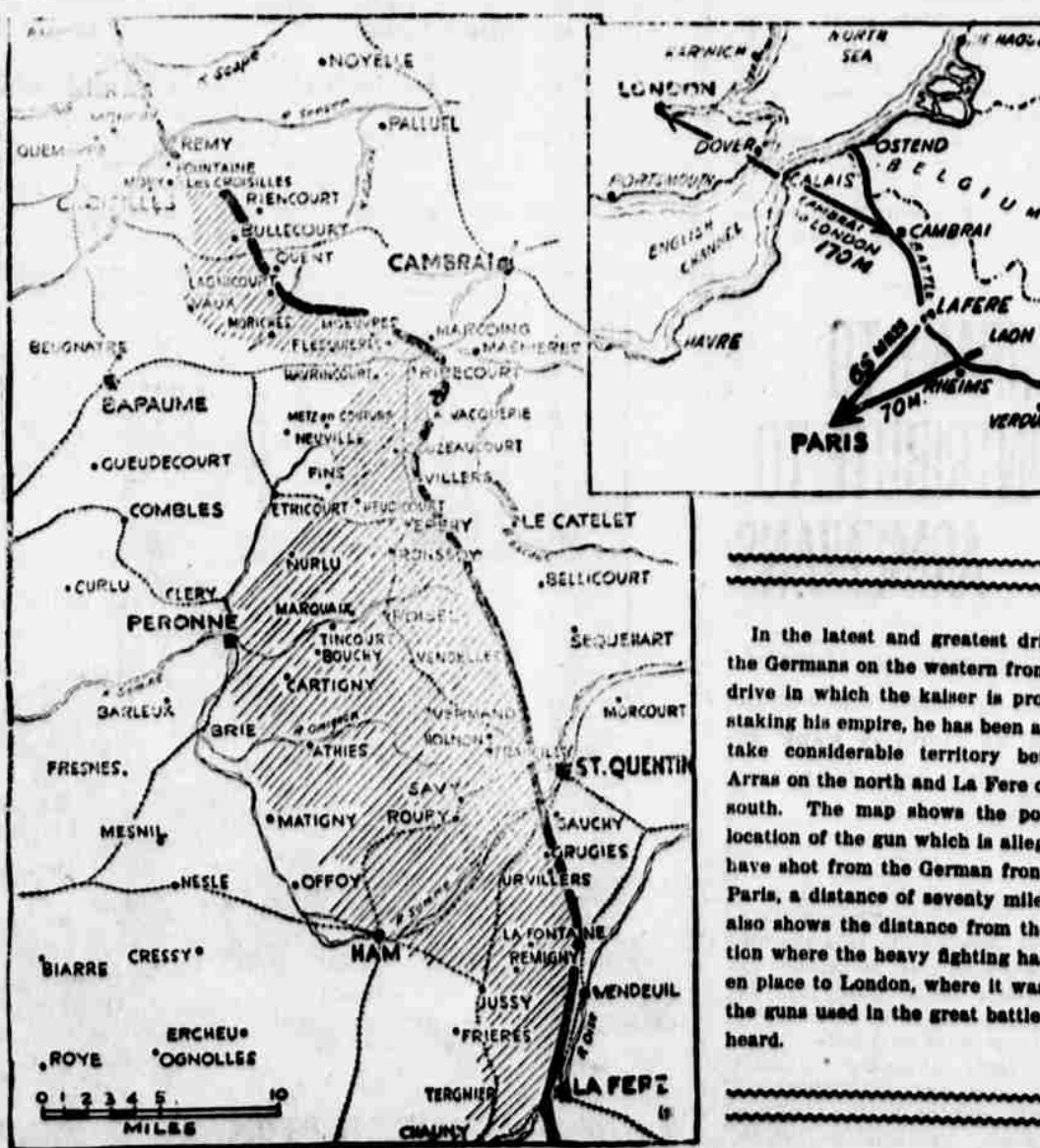

**Territory Taken By Germans in France in Greatest Drive  
Points From Which Shells May Have Been Shot Into Paris**

In the latest and greatest drive of  
the Germans on the western front, the  
drive in which the Kaiser is probably  
staking his empire, he has been able to  
take considerable territory between  
Arras on the north and La Fere on the  
south. The map shows the possible  
location of the gun which is alleged to  
have shot from the German front into  
Paris, a distance of seventy miles. It  
also shows the distance from the sec-  
tion where the heavy fighting has tak-  
en place to London, where it was said  
the guns used in the great battle were  
heard.
