BIG SHEEPMAN BUYS KLAMATH FARM PROPERTY LARGE RANCH BOUGHT 'NEAR KENO AND VERY EXTENSIVE ACREAGE LEASED FOR RANGE FROM TIMBER COMPANY An extensive realty deal has been completed here by which Jas. O'Keef, a large sheepman of Northern California, becomes the owner of the old Hanson ranch on the Klamath River, just above Keno, previously held by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company. Twenty-six thousand acres of the company's timber lands in the county are also leased by O'Keef for grazing purposes during the summer months, the ranch to be used for winter feeding. The Hanson ranch comprises 300 acres, and is in a very fertile area. The new owner proposes to irrigate by pumping from the river adjacent, and has already ordered a pump from the Baldwin Hardware company here. The consideration of the deal is announced at \$40,000.
