

England Must Now Go to Bed Early

LONDON, April 26.—Dining in public places in England must stop at 10 p. m., and theatrical performances must end at 10:30 p. m., under the curfew order which became effective this month. The regulation issued under the defense of the realm act is intended to save the use of coal and gas for lights and fires.

"Dora," as the defense of the realm

act is popularly known, has now been responsible for something like 212 orders since its birth in November, 1914. Its powers range over a wide and varied area, and deal with regulations for the destruction of stray dogs to the control of mines, canals, highways and shipyards. The civilian population is controlled by it in a way not even dreamt of before the war.

German Living Cost Raises 300 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 26.—Increases in wages paid in Germany have utterly failed to keep pace with the increased cost of living, says the April bulletin of the Department of Labor.

The average increase in wages has been 50 per cent, while the living cost has gone up 300 per cent. The greatest increase in wages has been received by Prussian metal workers, who are now getting 69 per cent more than they formerly received. Increases as low as 16 per cent have been reported,

and some women are still being paid less than \$2.50 per week.

The purchasing power of money has dropped to one-fourth its value before the war, according to the bulletin. German workmen, it says, are being underfed. One egg per week is their allowance. Oleomargarine is limited to an ounce and half for a family of four.

Sugar is more plentiful, the family allowance being one and one-half pounds. Coffee is practically unobtainable. Potatoes are the heaviest item in the ordinary diet.

Famine Visits The Cities of Persia

PETROGRAD, April 4.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—People are dying of hunger in the streets of the large towns of Persia, notably in Hamadan and Senne, says a dispatch from Kazvin to the Rostov-saya Rech.

"The spectre of famine has become a fearful reality," the correspondent wrote. "To pass thru two or three streets in Hamadan or Senne is enough to come upon two or three dead bodies. Here and there may be groups of women mourning over their dead. Here is a beggar woman—a mother with two children, one of them a baby in arms, is dead, and near the mother, on the ground, is another child dying. The mother herself is already motionless, with a frozen, unintelligent stare. The Persians, seeing that a human being is 'really' dying, shove some bread into the dying woman's mouth, but the belated help, of course, does not save her life. The poor villagers throng in great from the villages to the towns hoping in vain to be fed there.

"Even in Kazvin, this more or less well-to-do town, it has more than once fallen to the lot of your correspondent to take up from the streets poor, ragged, worn, and from exhaustion have been unable to move. Mothers sell their daughters, still mere children, in order to secure a crust of bread; wives of poor men are given to the rich, that their families may be maintained.

"In Hamadan a few days ago sparks of a hunger riot broke out, and it was only the presence of Russian troops that stopped the movement, that was ready to embrace the whole country with its flames.

"There is a report that Kuchik Khan, that freebooter's chief who lives in the forest near Reast, and has, under arms, about 30,000 mounted men.

Laws of the Road Cited By Officer

Chief of Police Wilson Calls Attention of Automobile Owners and Drivers of Jitneys to the Laws of the Road and the Rules Governing Their Operation.

The laws of the road, as defined by the Legislature of Oregon, and by ordinance of the City of Klamath Falls are:

1—Vehicles proceeding in opposite directions shall pass to the right, giving one-half the road to each vehicle.

2—Vehicles proceeding in the same direction overtake and pass by passing to the left.

3—The overtaking vehicle shall maintain its speed until clear of the overtaken vehicle, and for such distance thereafter as shall prevent dust and mud throwing on the overtaken vehicle.

4—The signal so to pass shall be given by one blast of the horn, bell or other signaling device.

5—Should the overtaken vehicle then not give way, three such blasts shall be given, and on failure to comply the overtaking vehicle may at the next suitable place safe to both vehicles go by without further signal.

6—It shall be the duty of every overtaken vehicle to turn to the right and give one-half the road.

7—Vehicles approaching an intersecting road, street or highway shall be under control, so as to permit the vehicle on the right of the vehicle approaching to first cross the intersection.

8—At all intersections, the vehicle approaching the intersection from the right of any vehicle approaching the intersection shall have the right of way.

9—All vehicles approaching an intersection of a street, road or highway with the intention of turning thereat, shall, in turning to the right, keep closely to the right, and in turning to the left shall run to and beyond the center of the intersection. For example: A vehicle coming up Sixth street with the intention of turning the intersection at Sixth and Main, must give a vehicle on Main approaching the intersection at the same time from the direction of Seventh street the right of way across the intersection.

10—The person in charge of any vehicle proposing to turn an intersection must give a plainly visible or

audible signal of his intention so to turn.

12—Every vehicle shall be kept upon the right half of the street, and no vehicle shall overtake and pass any other vehicle when the view ahead is not clear for at least 100 feet.

13—No vehicle shall be run at a greater speed than one mile in four minutes, or in plain English, 15 miles per hour, on any of the city streets.

14—No vehicle shall be operated on the street with an excessive smoking or noisy exhaust.

15—Vehicles are prohibited from standing on Main street between Second street and Ninth street, or on Sixth street between Main street and Klamath avenue, or on the easterly side of Fifth street, between Main street and Klamath avenue for a longer period than twenty minutes at any one time between the hours of 7 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m.

16—Vehicles are prohibited from stopping within thirty feet of any street corner.

17—In stopping on Main street vehicles must stop parallel with and close to curb.

18—On streets where vehicles are allowed to park, vehicles shall run in to curb in the direction of travel, with front to curb, and at an angle of approximately 45 degrees.

19—Vehicles for hire are prohibited from standing on the streets mentioned in subdivision 15 above, between the hours of 7 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m. The word "stand" as herein used means the use and occupancy of said streets by vehicles for hire while awaiting patronage. Such vehicles when not engaged in transporting passengers are not permitted to occupy or stand upon the streets mentioned between the hours mentioned.

20—Owners of vehicles should attend promptly for dimmers for their front lights.

21—A special act was passed by the legislature at its last session governing the driving or operating of a motor vehicle by a person in an intoxicated condition, fixing the penalty at not more than \$100 or imprisonment for a period of not more than 100 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
