NEW SHIP IS DESTROYED IN A COLLISION

NEW VESSEL BUILT AT SEATTLE EARLY THIS YEAR GOES TO BOTTOM OFF FRENCH COAST. ALL ON BOARD SAVED

NEW YORK, April 29.—The American steamship Westery, one of the first ships built by the Emergency Fleet corporation, was sunk in a collision off the French coast yesterday. All on board, however, were saved. The Westery was launched at the

Seattle shipyards of the Ames Shipbuilding corporation in February of this year. She was launched at a war brigade for the Cunard line, but was later commandeered by the shipping board.
