American Soldiers Declared Bum Cooks

PARIS, March 31.—(By mail)—At last a French correspondent has found a weak spot in the American Expeditionary Force. The man who has ventured to strike this discordant note is the special representative of Le Temps at the French front, who happened to be near the American section which had the first real fight with the enemy, and so paid them a visit. He writes:

"There are certain practical points

in which our allies are not yet past masters, notably cooking. At first, scorning their own stews, they preferred to stick to canned meats entirely. Our cooks showed them how to make soup, and they soon acquired a taste for it. It won't be long before they will be making some good stuff themselves, better anyway than the extraordinary mixtures I saw them eating this evening, like canned salmon with mashed potatoes and pickled cucumbers!"

Local Pupils Prove Aid to Government

Klamath Falls school pupils and teachers now own Liberty bonds and War Saving Stamps to the amount of \$11,070, according to a detailed report just submitted by City School Superintendent R. H. Dunbar, who has given this matter every possible stimulus. Of this amount \$9,338.25 is owned by the pupils. The children's investments in Liberty bonds is about 50 per cent more than in the stamps.

Proof that the National Army is really national is found in the facts about the officers of the 308th Infantry regiment, stationed at Camp Upton, Long Island. They come from Colorado, New York, Massachusetts, Illinois, Maine, California, Washington, D. C., Texas and Alabama. The 153d brigade, of which their regiment is a part, is commanded by a man from Ohio. The list contains an architect, an actor, a cotton cloth merchant, a Wall street man, business man, a steamship manager and two men from West Point, regular army men, who have had a lifetime training for war service.
