

Kansas Declared Very Wet State

Kansas is not as dry as it's cracked up to be, according to a letter received from Captain Hamilton, who is in training there. In fact, in the ten days that he had been there, it had rained five days, and at the time he

wrote there was three inches of snow on the ground.

Part of the letter reads as follows:

"I arrived at this camp April 10th, and was assigned to Company 30, Medical Officers' Training Camp. The

medical officers undergo a rigid military training here for three months, and are then assigned to permanent organization. About 1,500 are here in training at the present time. Many are leaving every day for overseas duty and new ones coming in.

"I was assigned to Company 30, but this week was transferred to Company 31, as company commander. I am held responsible for the drilling of the men under me, and am allowed a limited time in which to whip them into soldiers. I must forget that most of them are specialists in the profession, and that many are men of national reputation in certain branches of surgery or medicine, and treat them like a bunch of rookies.

"An officer, a captain, just came in the tent, who leaves tomorrow for 'over there.' Six medics occupy this tent, and we asked him if we could get a chance to go home for a visit before we sailed, and he said absolutely no, if we lived west of Denver. Four of us live on the coast, and the air is so blue in this tent right now that one could cut it in chunks. I hope I am not called before school is out, so I can have my wife and little daughter come and visit me once more before I go.

"My regards to all my friends in Old Klamath. After the d—n Hun is wiped off the face of the earth this will be a safe world in which to live, and not before. In the meantime, we must do our bit, the folks at home as well as those who go. I believe the loved ones who stay at home and have the courage to send the son, brother, father or husband into this awful carnage, for the cause of justice, humanity and freedom are the bravest. God bless them and keep up their courage. They are the ones who must keep the home fires burning.

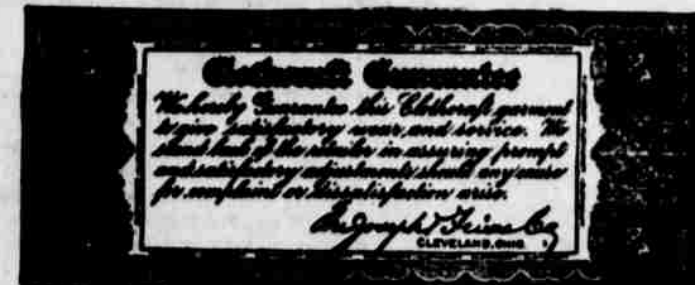
