Enemy Now Building Monster Submarines

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 1.—New reports of German activities in building giant U boats have reached Washington thru diplomatic channels. The latest describes an undersea monster of large proportions and unusual power, capable of cruising 10,000 miles. The U boat is a virtual cruiser, equipped, according to reports, to battle with allied convoys.
For some weeks allied officials have reported that Germany was exerting her building efforts to construct an undersea craft that would beat the great allied convoy system. She may be planning to launch a determined offensive against the steady lines of transportation drawn across the Atlantic.

Greeks Are Glad to Buy the Liberty Bonds

"Please Mr. Editor, can you write me a good word for the Greeks," writes Constantine N. Lampropoulos from Modoc Point, in a letter in which he calls attention to the very heavy subscription for Liberty bonds made by three Greeks employed at the Lamm Lambey company. He also calls attention to figures in a New York paper showing that the Greeks have subscribed a million and a half dollars to the loan.
The Greeks in the United States, he says, are all glad to buy Liberty bonds and help the United States win the war. They all like liberty, and many Greek boys are now in the trenches.

BANDITS RELEASE KYLE AFTER LONG PURSUIT

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 1.—The Chinese bandits have released George Kyle only after being worn out by military pursuit, instigated by the Chinese government. They finally surrendered him without ransom, after being given a promise of amnesty.

The Former Champion and His Kaiser Dummy

CANDIDATE OUTLINES POLICIES

LOCAL PHYSICIAN, WHO HAS SERVED THREE TERMS IN LEGISLATURE, MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT OF PLATFORM

Dr. George Merryman, who has recently announced his candidacy for the state legislature on the republican ticket, declares that his platform is conservation and economy in local and state government for a successful prosecution of the war. He believes the industries of this section and the State of Oregon are vital issues in the present struggle, and will encourage all legislation for increasing food production, lumber, irrigation and water power development. He has practiced medicine in this community for more than fifteen years, and his knowledge of the needs of the people in Eastern Oregon is obtained from his numerous trips over the county and district. If he is elected this district will have, with Mr. Burdick, two strong men in the legislature, who will be of great credit to the Twenty-first District in the legislature.
Dr. Merryman has already served three terms in the state legislature, in the lower house in 1907 and in the senate in 1909 and 1911. He refers to his record for progressive legislation during those terms, as qualification for further public service.
