War Worker Tells Of Life Among Soldiers

Extracts from a letter received from Alice J. Knight, deaconess of the Episcopal church, who is now engaged in war work in France, will be read with a great deal of interest by many local residents who knew her well. She says:

"In the first place, let me say that I am more thankful than I can express that I am privileged to be over here and to be helping a little in the wonderful work that the Y. M. C. A. is undertaking for the army and navy. Associated with us are some seven clergymen of our own church and two bishops, Bishop Israel, who is acting as chaplain at a certain hospital, and Bishop Brent, who spends some months of each year going from camp to camp, speaking to the men in the Y. M. C. A. huts.

"You probably know that the American Y. M. C. A. is planting huts as rapidly as possible in every camp and sending workers into the trenches with the men. The army authorities have given over to it the commissary business to a large extent, the not wholly. We have canteens for the men, where they may buy tobacco, cigarettes, soap, dental cream, tooth brushes, razors, towels, crackers and cookies, jam, grape juice, etc., and within the last few months, for the first time in its history, this men's institution has asked women to come and help. As fast as possible they are being brought over to work in the canteens.

"I am at present in a large center for troops. Out at the great camp, the Y. M. C. A. now has two buildings. They are what are called double huts. One side has a large room for entertainments, such as moving picture shows, concerts, etc., lectures and religious meetings, and a room for classes in French or any other subject that may be taught. The other has the kitchen, dining room and the rooms for men secretaries, and also the canteen. The canteen is a very large room, fitted up with tables and benches, where the boys may write letters on paper furnished free by the Y. M. C. A., as is the ink and also the pens and blotters they use. Here also is the library and such magazines and papers as are sent from home for the men. Games are also kept here and handed out as they ask for them, each man who takes one, giving his name and regiment, so that we may keep track of them. We have checkers, chess, dominoes, etc., and outside are ball grounds and basket-

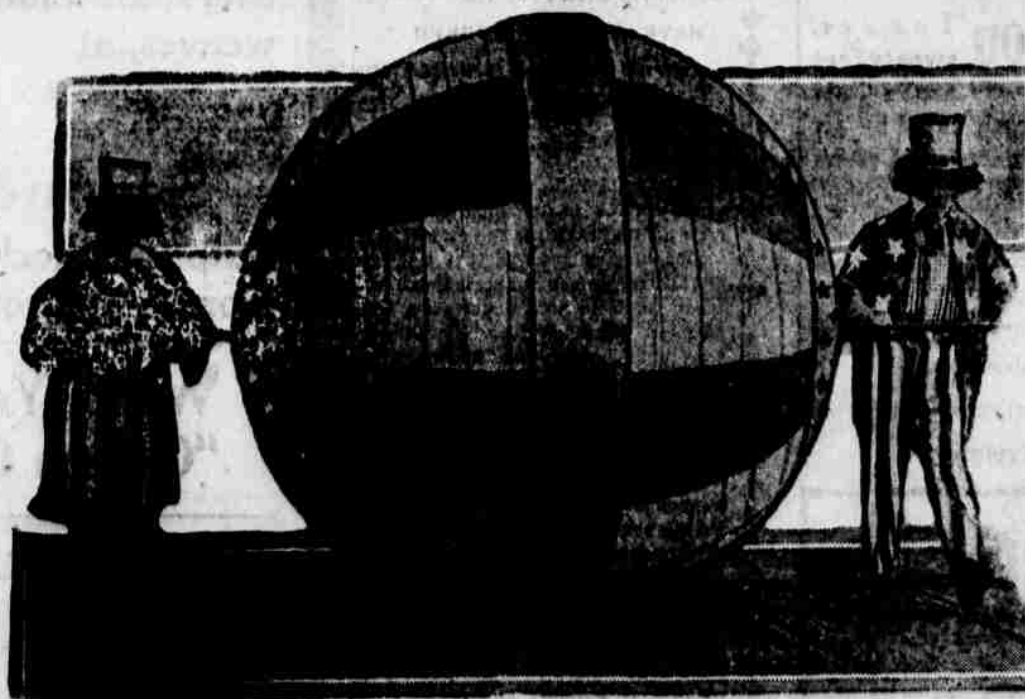
