Oakland Planning Big Exposition In October

OAKLAND, May 3.—Plans have been completed for one of the most comprehensive land and agricultural exhibitions ever held west of Chicago, in the Pacific Coast Land and Industrial Exposition, which will take place here August 15th, and continue for two months, closing October 15th. The affair will be held in the Civic Auditorium and surrounding grounds, which comprise an area of more than thirty acres, and is planned for the exploitation of the resources of the West, being fostered by a group of men well known in business and financial circles, on a non-profit making basis.

The general plan includes exhibitions and demonstrations of land resources, manufactured products, livestock, poultry, tractors and automobiles and an "Allied Amusement Zone" of great scope. A stadium where round-ups and historical events with bands of vaqueros and Indians depicting the days of '49 is also included in the plan, and in the auditorium itself the arena will serve as a meeting place for the professional and amateur athletes of the world, and the theater for the appearance of noted musicians, band masters and stage celebrities. The exposition will include all the states of the Pacific Coast.

REVOLUTION
APPROACHING
IN AUSTRIA

UNMISTAKABLE SIGNS DECLARED BECOMING MORE EVIDENT DAILY—DEMONSTRATIONS TAKING PLACE IN THE JUGO-SLAV PROVINCES

LONDON, May 3.—A dispatch sent out by Reuters Limited, says:

"It has been learned from Serbian sources that unmistakable signs of an approaching revolution in Austria-Hungary are becoming daily more evident. A plebiscite is being held among the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, in favor of their union with Serbia and Montenegro in one national independent state under the scepter of King Peter of Serbia. The prime archbishop of Carniola is at the head of this movement."

"Demonstrations of a very serious character are taking place in the Jugo-Slav provinces. Now comes news that at the request of the Austrian government, and with the sanction of the pope, the nuncio at Vienna has opened a disciplinary inquiry against the archbishop of Carniola for placing himself at the head of this revolutionary movement. Great developments are expected."
