The Zeebrugge Mole Blown Up By British Under Admiral Tyrwhitt



the British raiders under Admiral Sir R. V. Tyrwhitt and Germans. The admiral led his men in cruisers to the mole and boarded it. After a fight the Germans ran, and much property was destroyed by the British. Two old submarines loaded with explosives were sent against the sides to blow up the mole. The map shows the relation of Zeebrugge and Ostend, points of the Belgian coast, which the Germans have made their submarine bases, to the coast of England and the English channel. Both points were attacked by the raiding force under Admiral Tyrwhitt. Neither town has a harbor, so small vessels, and particularly submarines have entered the canals for refuge and repairs. The admiral sank three old cruisers loaded with cement at the mouth of the canal leading from Zeebrugge to Bruges, so submarines will be bottled up there and those at sea will not be able to get in. He ran two more cruisers toward the mouth of the canal at Ostend, but there was some doubt if they reached its mouth.

This mole, which juts out into the North Sea more than a mile and a half from Zeebrugge, thus forming the harbor for the town, because there is no natural bay to receive ships, was the scene of the desperate battle between

Probably for the first time a hogan, by which name the home of the Navajo Indian is known, will be shown on the screen in the Triangle drama of the Painted Desert, "Man Above the Law," at the Temple theater tonight. The Navajos are sun worshippers, and their hogans of mud and sticks are built so that they face east, and the occupants are awakened by the rising sun. In all five hogans were constructed, exact reproductions of those still to be found occasionally on the painted desert. In addition to these huts, a trading post and mission school were erected of the same material, and these served for most of the location work in Wells' picture. The village was built in the heart of the Southern California hills, miles from civilization, and almost the entire picture was made there.
