

PRICES NOW TREMENDOUS IN BELGIUM

PARIS, May 6.—A prominent Belgian who has remained in the occupied territory has succeeded in getting a letter thru to his son, now serving on the Belgian front on the Yser. The writer says that everything in the country that is necessary to feeding it is requisitioned by the Germans, and the form in which requisitions are made adds bitterness to the act, as the decree announcing the seizure reads, "to ensure the feeding of the population, we order . . ."

Camp Lewis Boys Name Their Trenches

All Parts of the Northwest Are Represented In the Odd Names That Appear at the Entrances of the Training Camp Dugouts. Will Be Carried Over to France

CAMP LEWIS, May 6.—That many of the familiar names of the Far West will be carried to the battle front in France when the Wild West division goes across is indicated by the designations applied to trenches and dugouts at Camp Lewis. A stroll thru the divisional trench system denied civilians for military reasons, reveals scores of names known thruout the country, but particularly to Westerners.

A modern trench system designed to afford protection to thousands of men from enemy fire is a veritable labyrinth of deep ditches with many dugouts penetrating deep underground. To wend your way to a designated point without losing valuable time is a problem when whisbangs are coming over. So to make traveling easier, the men have placed neatly painted signs bearing the name they prefer for their particular trenches and dugouts.

Just why the fire trench of one regiment was called "Pleasant Valley" can only be conjectured. "Powder River Boulevard" indicates where the Montana boys tolled to erect their defenses. "Rounding Avenue" named at the entrance to a communicating trench savors of the entire West. "Salt Lake Drive" adorns another "ditch," which is just wide enough to permit of easy walking and deep enough to protect a six-footer from the spray of a machine gun. "Starved Rock Way" is the direction on still another trench. "Dead Horse Canyon" may have come from any Western State.

When it comes to name for dugouts, variety appears to have known no bounds. Principally, they bear the names of famous resorts, taverns or hostleries. Occasionally a name is seen which has been in the limelight during a reform wave. One yawning black hole is topped with the name of a well known tavern on Powell street in San Francisco.

Thus thruout the entire trench system one encounters names which mark the builders as coming from anywhere as far north as Montana and Washington on the north, to Utah, Nevada or California on the south.

Old Steamboat Company Retires From Business

CORVALLIS, May 6.—The Oregon City Transportation company has retired its steamers from the Portland to Corvallis run, ending steamboat service on the Upper Willamette after thirty-two years operation. Extreme cost of operation and lack of business in the Willamette Valley territory are assigned as reasons for the discontinuance.

Since 1886, when the steamer Latona made her appearance on the Willamette, the line has been in service except when extreme river conditions or the closing of the locks at Oregon City prevented. Captain A. B. Graham and Captain A. W. Graham, brothers, have been in charge of the fleet all the time, first acting as masters of the vessels, and later giving all their time to the management of the business ashore.

During the past few years revenues have declined, while expenses took the opposite trend, until Captain A. B. Graham regretfully announced the suspension of service, to take place Monday, May 6th.
