SOLDIERS MAY RETURN HOME FOR ELECTION

ADJUTANT GENERAL AT WASHINGTON PLACES THIS PRIVILEGE AT DISCRETION OF COMMANDING OFFICERS OF VARIOUS CAMPS

SALEM, May 3.—Furloughs for Oregon soldiers who desire to vote at elec-

tions this year are entirely within the prerogative of commanding officers of their divisions, and they will not be over-ruled. This information came to Governor Withycombe from Senator McNary, who conferred with Adjutant General McCain at Governor Withycombe's request.

The ruling will apply to soldiers in or near the state, and will include Fort Stevens, Canby and Columbia, Vancouver barracks and Camp Lewis.

While soldiers may vote any place in the state, and in some cases will merely have to cross the state boundary to reach the polls, it is presumed that many will seek to take advantage of the opportunity to return home on furloughs.

Wins \$1,000 for American Creed

THE AMERICAN CREED

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

The city of Baltimore paid William Tyler Page of Friendship Heights, Md., \$1,000 for "The American Creed" in a contest in which many thousand creeds were submitted. Henry S. Chapin, nearly two years ago, suggested the contest, and when it was taken up by

the city it became the "National Citizens' Creed Contest." President Wilson, Speaker Clark and other prominent Americans have endorsed the award to Mr. Page, who is a descendant of President Tyler and of Carter Braxton, who signed the Declaration of Independence.

Eighty-Eight Names on Casualty List Today

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—The three died of wounds and nine of dis-casualty list today contained eighty-eight names. Six were killed in action.

Big Loan Total May Reach \$4,000,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—For the third time within a year the American people have heavily oversubscribed a war credit.

It is now estimated that the total of the Third Liberty loan will reach \$4,000,000,000 this week, when the banks have time to tabulate all applications.

The exact result of the campaign probably will not be known until late in the week.

Official estimates placed the number of subscribers at between 12,000,000 and 15,000,000—far above the 10,000,000 of the second loan or the 4,500,000 of the first—and some officials expressed the belief that the roll of bond buyers would be even greater. To them

this was one of the most encouraging features of the loan.

All twelve federal reserve districts which were the largest campaign units oversubscribed, and a majority of the states made the same record.

Ralph E. Williams

REPUBLICAN

Candidate for National Committeeman

Ralph E. Williams of Portland, native son of Oregon, and present republican national committeeman, is a candidate for renomination and election. All Oregon knows that Mr. Williams was the chief factor in bringing about the reunion of the republican and progressive parties in the state in 1916, resulting in Oregon being the only state in the West to cast its electoral vote for Hughes. That Mr. Williams' splendid work in harmonizing the various elements of the republican and progressive parties is also recognized nationally, is attested by strong letters of endorsement, written by William E.
