The cause of the shooting was believed to have been the confession of Dr. Chandra on the stand that he had used revolutionary funds for himself.

Morals of Aviators Carefully Watched

AMERICAN AVIATION CAMP, Southern Italy, April 15—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Control of young men on a foreign soil is considered one of the main difficulties of their training by the American commander here. The instruction in the art of practical flying is far easier than teaching them how to avoid the

inevitable temptations presented to visitors in a new and interesting country. As the very life of the aviator depends on their mental and physical condition, without counting machines worth \$5,000 or more each, the commander is doing all in his power to teach his aviators to lead sober lives in every respect.

American Red Cross Makes Huge Donation

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—The war council of the American Red Cross announces a gift of \$10,000,000 (\$1,750,000) to the French Red Cross. This donation was made after a personal investigation of conditions in France by Henry P. Davidson, chairman of the war council, and other Red Cross officials. In a cablegram received at national headquarters, Mr. Davidson expressed the opinion that if the American people could be in France today they would leave nothing undone to contribute to and support the French people, and pay high tribute to the French courage.

The French Red Cross voluntary organization has been so pressed for funds it either had to get money from some source or curtail its work. A thorough investigation of the situation was made, and it was the unanimous recommendation of the finance committee of the Red Cross Commission to France and heads of the various departments, backed by the opinion of the French government and French experts, that a contribution of this character to the French Red Cross at this juncture would be as effective and as deeply appreciated by the French people as anything that could be done.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—A department of justice investigation on the charges of graft in the aircraft production made by Investigator Gutson Borglum the sculptor, has been ordered by the president. Borglum's charges of pro-German influences will also be probed. A demand for criminal investigation was recently made in the senate.

SEDITION BILL HAS PASSED BOTH HOUSES

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—The sedition bill is now ready for the president's signature.

The rough and ready discipline applied to infantry or artillery or cavalry has not been found adapted to aviators on whose morals so much depends. Downright drunkenness and contraction of avoidable diseases are the only two offenses which meet with severe punishment, and the latter always means courtmartial.

For the rest, persuasion is used. In the nightly lectures on flying, the aviators frequently are reminded of this stern fact: "You have been sent over here after great expense by the government of the United States. A whole lot of money is being spent on you, probably more than some of you are worth. But you were picked out as first class men, and it's up to you to prove it."
