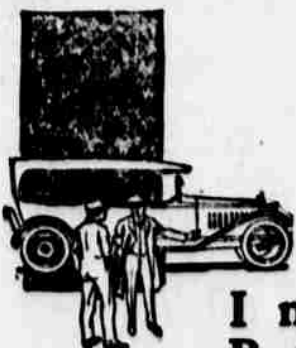

Klamath Spuds Are Unusually High Grade

Stringent Measures Have Been Adopted By Department of Horticulture to Keep Them Unblemished. Many Have Unknowingly Broken Planting Regulations

That Klamath County is rapidly coming to the front as a potato raising section, and that in order to properly protect her product from contamination from outside sections, there are the most stringent rules for the inspection at Klamath Falls of all spuds entering or leaving the county, is emphasized in a letter from C. A. Allen of the state board of horticulture at Medford, to M. S. Taylor, local inspector.

Reasons for the measures adopted by the department are of sufficient interest to the general public that the following parts are taken from the letter. A number of local merchants and shippers have unintentionally infringed on the articles of this ruling, it is declared, and its publicity will probably correct this in the future. No charge will be made for inspection, and it is for the interest of all to have the ruling strictly followed:

The letter to M. S. Taylor from Mr. Allen follows:

"In regard to the shipping in of potatoes from California, would say that it is strictly against the law for any person, firm or corporation to ship in even one potato into Klamath County at any point except Klamath Falls, and the law required that the shipment, whether it contains one potato or a train load, must have attached a certificate of inspection from a California inspector (or other duly authorized authority) and must be held at the receiving office, whether postoffice, railway or express (or any other way) for your inspection.

"The greatest danger we have is from these small shipments. Any one caught importing California potatoes against this law will be prosecuted. The violation carries both fine and imprisonment with it.

"Klamath County is coming rapidly to the fore in the production of good potatoes, and I intend to do all in my power to prevent the importing of in-

festated potatoes into the county, so as to protect the crops.

"I feel certain that if the people only understood the grave danger threatening the potato from the tuber moth, they would one and all do all in their power to co-operate with us in this campaign to prevent its introduction.

"If one female moth escapes into the county at the right time, and gets her eggs to hatch, unless thru costly and very difficult work they are exterminated at once, it will cost Klamath County thousands of dollars each year—for the potatoes will not only become unsalable, but the county will be quarantined so that they cannot sell them.

"We raised in our laboratory in a glass cage, over 300 moths from three tubers within a few weeks. They multiply at an astounding rate."

Oregon State Board of Horticulture, Notice of Quarantine No. 2.

1.—Every shipment of common potatoes from the State of California to the State of Oregon must be accompanied by a certificate of inspection signed by a county horticultural commissioner or other duly authorized horticultural inspector of said State of California, certifying that he has inspected the potatoes in said shipment, and found them free from the potato tuber moth, its larva or pupa. Such certificate shall be signed in writing, and shall specify the locality where said potatoes are grown; the date of inspection, and the number of sacks, boxes or other containers included in the shipment inspected.

2.—Every shipment of potatoes grown in California which is brought into Oregon must be brought to the city of Portland, or to Astoria, Salem, Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford or Klamath Falls, and must be held at the wharf, dock, railroad yards, freight depot or express company's depot or office of the common carrier

bringing such potatoes into the state until said potatoes have been inspected by the state inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture or by some other duly authorized inspector working under direction of the said state board of horticulture, and permission has been given by the inspector making such inspection to deliver the potatoes. The common carrier, person, firm or corporation bringing potatoes into Oregon which are grown in California must notify the state board of horticulture or the state inspector of said board of the arrival of such potatoes, and hold the shipment as hereinbefore provided.

3.—If, upon inspection, any of the potatoes in any shipment are found to be infested with the potato tuber moth, its larva or pupa, or show indications that they have been so infested, the person, firm or corporation who has brought said shipment of potatoes from California to this state must take said shipment of potatoes back to California within four days from the date of inspection of said potatoes, provided that if the infestation shall be in such condition that the inspector believes there would be danger of escape of the potato tuber moth from the shipment in course of transit thru the state, the person, firm or corporation bringing the shipment into the state will be required to destroy the shipment, including the containers, by burning up the same.
