

Biggest Parades In History On Saturday

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 14.—Plans have been made by the American Red Cross for the biggest nationwide series of parades ever held on one day. Fifteen hundred cities and towns are included in the plans, which contemplate the participation of more than 5,000,000 men and women. These parades will be held on Saturday, May 18th, two days preceding the second Red Cross campaign to raise \$100,000,000 for war relief.

Red Cross nurses will have the place of honor in the parades. This is because of the arduous and heroic labor to which the nurse is assigned, and furthermore, since nursing was the fundamental service on which the organization was founded, she symbolizes in the public mind the spirit of the Red Cross as nothing else can.

The nursing section will be led by members of state and local committees preceded by banners giving the total number of Red Cross nurses from the particular city or county on active

duty with the army and navy, or directly under the Red Cross. A Red Cross nurse bearing a Red Cross service flag with the blue stars representing the number on active duty will also precede the uniformed nurses.

Home Boy Describes Crossing to France

An interesting letter telling of his crossing to France has just been received from Sergeant Claude Stanley Wood by his parents here. It is apparent from this letter that the lot of some of the boys is by no means unpleasant, at times, at least. The letter follows:

"I wish you could all have the wonderful ocean trip that Uncle Sam is giving me. It is wonderful to stand on one of the decks and look out over the endless water, especially at night. The weather has been beautiful, and fortunately I have not been sick an hour. In fact, very few of our men have—which speaks well for the physical condition of our men.

"We have yet several days of sailing, and I would really like to see a few hours of rough weather i. e., not a hurricane, but just enough to have a complete sea experience.

"Maybe I am a fool, but so far I have gone to bed and slept as well as I ever slept at home. Of course, there is

some danger, but I have no anxiety whatever. In fact, I think that our crew is too smart for the Germans. I hope you are not worrying, for really there is no need of it.

"How I wish I might give you the details of the trip, but I'll have to reserve them for our visit after the war. I did not get the ship I wanted, but got one just as good or better. She is one of the big modern passenger steamers. What makes my trip especially enjoyable are the accommodations afforded. All non-coms above 17 (I am 13) have staterooms and officers mess—served in the second cabin. Ord. Sgt. Trowbridge and myself have a delightful stateroom. It has two fine beds or bunks, with the original ship's bedding, a settee, running water, lights, etc. Our mess is great. It is served in courses with the ship's linen and silver. Real English waiters serve it in courses and style. I'd send a menu, but it gives the date and name of the ship.

"A wonderful military band is giving a concert in the main salon tonight. They played this morning out doors, and it sure was enjoyable.

"I haven't seen any large fish yet, but have seen the flying fish. I hope to see the larger ones soon, for they are frequently seen by the men.

"I wish I might tell you about our means of defense, etc., for it is extremely interesting, but I must refrain. You must be patient, for from now on I must be very limited in my stories of camp life. I know you would like to know about it, but you will see the wisdom of discretion.

"Please give my kindest regards to my friends, and tell them I am happy.

"Sgt. Claude Stanley Wood.

"Later—We have had, or are having our storm, and it was great. But now I have had enough, for it has lasted for twenty hours so far. It is not serious, but all during the night we were rolled around in bed like dolls. It has failed to make me sick, tho it got a number of the boys.—C. S. W."

Notice Inviting Bids for Installing Sewer Main

Bids will be received by the Common Council up to and including the 20th day of May, at 8 o'clock p. m., for installing a six-inch sewer main in Fairview Addition "one" and "two," between the points named as follows:

Beginning at the intersection (center of intersection) of Delta street and the alley separating Fairview Addition No. 1 from Fairview Addition No. 2, running thence south thru the center of said alley to Upham street; thence to a connection with the manhole at the center of the intersection of Upham and Prospect streets; beginning again at center of intersection of said alley and Fulton street, and running thence west on Fulton street to the west boundary line of Oregon avenue, terminating in a manhole to be installed at said last mentioned point.

The main is to be installed under the direction and supervision of the city engineer, and will include the placing of Y's and manholes and lamp-holes as he may direct and order.

The city will furnish 600 feet of six-inch vitrified sewer pipe. The successful bidder to furnish balance of pipe required. The total length of main to be installed being 1,370 feet.

The installation to be completed within thirty days from the date of entering into bond and contract for its installation.

A bond of \$500 will be required from the successful bidder.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check to the amount of 10 per cent of bid, to be forfeited by successful bidder in the event of failure to enter into contract and bond with the city council within five days after award.

United States Senator CHARLES L. McNARY

Because United States Senator Charles L. McNary made good he should be nominated to succeed himself in the republican primary, May 17.

From the day he became senator he has loyally championed the prosecution of the war, and during his term



of office has accomplished more for Oregon than any other member in congress in a like period.

Among his colleagues he is known as "the man on the job," and during the present war crisis Oregon should consider itself fortunate in having an opportunity to return him, and not be compelled to send to Washington a new, untrained man.

Championing the cause of the Oregon farmers, Senator McNary procured for them a primary wheat market, saving thereby several million dollars to the wheat growers of the Northwest.

Realizing the present food control law fails to fix prices for many commodities, Senator McNary has introduced, and is laboring for the passage of a bill, striking at profiteering and fixing prices on the necessities of life.

Senator McNary has procured Government contracts for the first time in the State's history for Oregon products, such as prunes, dehydrated potatoes and vegetables in large quantities.

Large government contracts for army clothing and shipbuilding yards; favorable action by the senate committee on irrigation on a bill providing for the government marketing of district irrigation bonds, thereby supplying funds for irrigation projects;

Favorable action from same committee on a bill authorizing the secretary of the interior to accept irrigation or drainage district bonds and exchange them with the secretary of the treasury for certificates of indebtedness, thereby providing funds for legitimate products.

Senator McNary is working: For prompt payments of allotments to dependent relatives of our soldiers and sailors;

For the construction of a coast military highway at government expense; A comprehensive plan for the utilization of the water resources of Oregon;

An appropriation of \$500,000 for the purchase of farm implements and stock for the Klamath Indians.

Senator McNary was born on a farm in Oregon; reared in the Baptist church; educated in the public schools; worked his way thru Stanford University; is a lawyer and farmer, and has been a life-long republican. He was formerly a justice of the Supreme Court, and later chairman of the state republican central committee.

Space forbids further enumeration of the vast amount of work Senator McNary has done for Oregon, but any one will realize from the foregoing the senator has displayed truly remarkable ability, coupled with extraordinary diligence and energy. His native state can best show its appreciation of his faithful and efficient services by nominating and electing.
