Dogs Now Trained to
Lead Blind Soldiers

PLESSIS-TREVISE, France, April
15.—(Correspondence of the Associat-
ed Press)—Training of dogs to lead
the blind has become an important in-
stitution here, where thousands of an-
imals will eventually be prepared to
lead sightless soldiers. The work is
being done under the direction of the
military authorities by amateurs who
owned kennels of police and hunting
dogs before the war.

Several hundred poodles are con-
tinually trotting about the neighbor-
hood and thru the village, some of
them "graduates" of the big training
school, leading "poules" who left their
sight in the trenches or in the battle-
field. This real experience puts the
finishing touch to the dogs' education.

The training is divided into two
periods, during the first of which the
dog learns what is called "carriage,"
or road behavior, abstinence from
quarrels and resistance to temptations
to playing with other dogs, neglect of

garbage boxes and butcher shops. Next
he is taught to avoid obstacles and
how to pick his way across the street
with regard for vehicles.

Then he is turned over to a sightless
hero of the war, and kept under ob-
servation for a few days to make sure
that his training is complete.

The blind man, too, requires a little
training with the dog, for he finds it
an entirely different matter to follow
the string after having been led by
the arm. Guided by a person, he aban-
dons himself to his conductor, and
loses all notion of self reliance, feeling
that he is dominated by another will
than his own. Consequently he insuffi-
ciently develops his remaining senses
to make up for the one that is lacking.
Led by a dog which must be ordered,
no matter how efficient his training,
he develops the senses of touch and
hearing with remarkable rapidity thru
the necessity of remaining constantly
attentive.

Central Powers Will
Make Supreme Effort

LONDON, May 15.—The predicted
double drive on the western and Ital-
ian fronts, which may result from the
conference of the kaiser and Em-
peror Charles of Austria at German
great headquarters, probably will be
the greatest blow of the war, accord-
ing to advices from Amsterdam.

Austria and Germany are resolved to
stick together to the end.

It is believed negotiations will de-
cide the future relations between Aus-
tria and Germany. It is understood
there will be negotiations for a new
alliance, together with military and
customs unions. It is doubtful, how-
ever, if it could be attained. The great
Austrian question now is whether con-
tinued existence of a separate Austrian
state is possible. The southern Slav-
German provinces deny such a possi-
bility. One party desires to see the
state consist of small sovereign prin-
cipalities, each having a foreign policy
of its own; the other demands a
return to the German federation. The
outcome is uncertain.

on Dental Hygiene—No. 1

What
Causes Tooth
Decay?

WE know that when
food is left ex-
posed to warm air for a
given time it ferments or
turns sour. Food caught be-
tween the teeth ferments, and
this fermentation is usually
caused by very small plants
called micro-organisms. Food
deposits in the mouth or in
between the teeth soon fer-
ment and decompose, forming
an acid, which is a solvent for
the enamel of the teeth. One
decayed tooth affects its neigh-
boring tooth.

It will thus be seen that decay is
due to the presence of fer-
menting food particles in the
mouth. Remove this by means
of a tooth-brush, or dental
floss, or by any other way,
and you will help to prevent
decay of teeth.

Diseases which occur in
childhood, such as tonsillitis,
measles, diphtheria, scarlet
fever, and others, cause the
teeth to become liable to
decay more easily. This is
because during sickness the
teeth do not receive proper
nourishment and care. Very
often the six-year molars
come through with defective
enamel. When this happens
to them, or any other teeth,
it is very dangerous that they
be kept clean until they can
be treated and filled by the
dentist.

Notice Inviting Bids for Installing
Sewer Main

Bids will received by the Common
Council up to and including the 20th
day of May, at 8 o'clock p. m., for in-
stalling a six-inch sewer main in Fair-
view Addition "one" and "two," be-
tween the points named as follows:

Beginning at the intersection (center
of intersection) of Delta street and
the alley separating Fairview Addition
No. 1 from Fairview Addition No. 2,
running thence south thru the center
of said alley to Upham street; thence
to a connection with the manhole at
the center of the intersection of Up-
ham and Prospect streets; beginning
again at center of intersection of said
alley and Fulton street, and running
thence west on Fulton street to the
west boundary line of Oregon avenue,
terminating in a manhole to be in-
stalled at said last mentioned point.

The main is to be installed under
the direction and supervision of the
city engineer, and will include the
placing of Y's and manholes and lamp-
holes as he may direct and order.

The city will furnish 600 feet of six-
inch vitrified sewer pipe. The success-
ful bidder to furnish balance of pipe
required. The total length of main to
be installed being 1,370 feet.

The installation to be completed
within thirty days from the date of
entering into bond and contract for its
installation.

A bond of \$500 will be required from
the successful bidder.

All bids must be accompanied by a
certified check to the amount of 10
per cent of bid, to be forfeited by suc-
cessful bidder in the event of failure
to enter into contract and bond with
the city council within five days after
award.
