GREAT BRITAIN MAKING "FABRICATED VESSELS"

LONDON, May 17.—"Fabricated" vessels are one of the latest and most interesting developments of Great Britain's ship building drive. A fabricated ship is one whose component parts are manufactured in other than ship building yards, usually in plants inland. The new fabricated ship is larger than most of the standard ships and there is not a curved frame in it. In fabrication of ships the aim was to increase speed of production, and also to utilize for shipbuilding purposes such plants as bridge-building yards and land engine factories.

It is expected that ships of the new type soon will materially increase the tonnage output.

Draft Registration Day Coming Soon

PORTLAND, May 17.—Registration of young men of Oregon and other states who have reached the age of 21 years since last June 5th, will be required on a day soon to be set by proclamation of President Wilson.

This day will be fixed by the president as soon as congress enacts the necessary legislation, now pending. That is expected to be very soon.

In the meantime, the task of organizing Oregon for this new registration of men for military service has already begun under instructions from the war department. These instructions emphasize the need for perfecting beforehand a complete working organization so that on the day set the registration will be 100 per cent strong.

On last June 5th, all men between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, were required to register for military service. As the number of men now in the 21-year-old class is estimated to be approximately only one tenth of those registered then, the task this year will not be so great.

However, it will be heavy enough to require the most alert co-operation on the part of every local board, and of state, county and city officials, to carry it thru.

NEW THEORY REGARDING CANCER

PARIS, May 17.—The theory that cancer is not of microbic origin, but is due to the excessive elimination of certain substances normally contained in the blood, is supported by a report of the researches of Professor Dubard, just published by the Academy of Medicine. Finding that the system of cancerous subjects was partially poor in magnesium, Prof. Dubard administered large doses of it to patients operated on for cancer, and reports encouraging results in a large number of cases.

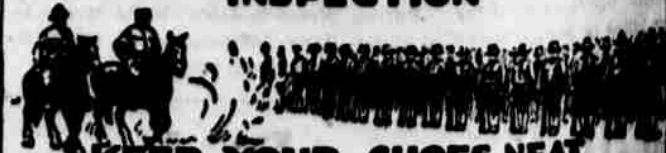
