**State Crop Report
Shows Rain Needed**

PORTLAND, May 18.—A summary
of weather and crop conditions in Ore-
gon for the past week, issued by the
local weather bureau here, states that
beneficial showers fell in scattered lo-
calities of the northern and western
portions of the state, stimulating
growth of vegetation which was be-
ginning to feel the need of rain; else-
where little or no precipitation occur-
red, and where irrigation water was
not available, crops, while not actually
suffering, now require moisture for
best results. Dry northerly winds,
with unusually cold nights, have been
detrimental, retarding germination and
growth.

Farm work, according to the sum-
mary, has advanced under favorable
conditions, except in some districts,
where the ground is becoming too hard
for proper cultivation.

Grass of all kinds made slow growth
where unirrigated. Alfalfa and clover
were fair to good, and pastures and
ranges were getting short in some
places, particularly on hill ranges,
which are becoming very dry and
much in need of rain.

Cattle and sheep are in good condi-

tion. Many sheep are being sheared in
Benton, and this work is practically
completed in Umatilla county. Some
injury to fruit was caused by frosts
on May 8th. The fruits are looking
somewhat better in Jackson County,
and do not appear to have been dam-
aged by drought. Reports from Doug-
las County indicate that peaches and
cherries will be a failure, but that
good crops of prunes, pears and apples
may be expected, the weather bureau
says. First Oregon strawberries of the
season were marketed from Doug-
las county on the ninth, and were of
good size and quality.

Corn and potato planting continued,
and these crops are about all in in
southwestern valleys. Some early po-
tatoes were nipped by frost. Other
truck crops are coming on slowly.
Planting of sorghum is being under-
taken in some localities. The sum-
mary covers the week ending May
11th.

Notice Inviting Bids for Installing
Sewer Main

Bids will be received by the Common
Council up to and including the 20th
day of May, at 5 o'clock p. m., for in-
stalling a six-inch sewer main in Fair-
view Addition "one" and "two," be-
tween the points named as follows:

Beginning at the intersection (cen-
ter of intersection) of Delta street and
the alley separating Fairview Addition
No. 1 from Fairview Addition No. 2,
running thence south thru the center
of said alley to Upham street; thence
to a connection with the manhole at
the center of the intersection of Up-
ham and Prospect streets; beginning
again at center of intersection of said
alley and Fulton street, and running
thence west on Fulton street to the
west boundary line of Oregon avenue,
terminating in a manhole to be in-
stalled at said last mentioned point.

The main is to be installed under
the direction and supervision of the
city engineer, and will include the
placing of Y's and manholes and lamp-
holes as he may direct and order.

The city will furnish 600 feet of six-
inch vitrified sewer pipe. The success-
ful bidder to furnish balance of pipe
required. The total length of main to
be installed being 1,370 feet.

The installation to be completed
within thirty days from the date of
entering into bond and contract for its
installation.

A bond of \$500 will be required from
the successful bidder.

All bids must be accompanied by a
certified check to the amount of 10
per cent of bid, to be forfeited by suc-
cessful bidder in the event of failure
to enter into contract and bond with
the city council within five days after
award.
