MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

Whereas, The President of the United States, who is also president of the American Red Cross, has set aside the week beginning Monday, May 20th, as the period for response to the call for

subscriptions to the American Red Cross War Fund; and, Whereas, The patriotic citizens of Klamath Falls have been called upon to observe this week by giving generously to the Red Cross and to give their time and effort to aid in a campaign for subscriptions, therefore, I, C. B. Crisler, mayor of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by these presents do

Proclaim, That it is the first duty of all patriotic citizens of Klamath Falls, during the week beginning May 20th, to subscribe generously to the war fund of the American Red Cross, to give such aid and assistance to the campaign for subscriptions as may be required from them by the authorized committees of the Red Cross Chapter, to display the insignia of the Red Cross in the form of badges, banners and posters continuously during the week, and otherwise to assist by word and deed in the successful prosecution of the subscription campaign, to the end that the community of Klamath Falls may be creditably represented in the number of subscriptions and the total amount subscribed, and may do its full share towards the work of mercy that it is the duty of the American Red Cross to perform during our country's war.

McNary Moves to Protect Stockmen

BEND, May 20.—Acting on a telegram received from the Bend Commercial Club protesting against the enlargement of the Crater Lake National Park to take in an additional 126 sections of land, Senator McNary has conferred with officials of the forest service at Washington, and after learning that portions of the land contemplated in the enlargement were used for grazing purposes, has requested that these lands be eliminated from the bill, according to a telegram received from

him by H. J. Overturf of the Commercial Club.

"I was informed by the director of service that stock was pasturing on portions of the proposed enlargement," says Senator McNary, "and believe it will be feasible to eliminate this land from the proposed extension. You may be assured that no injury will be done to the stock interests in this matter, and what was proposed was under the advice that ranges would not be injuriously affected."

Early Marriage Is Ordered In Germany

LONDON, May 20.—The German commission appointed to examine the decline in the birth rate in Germany has reported a recommendation for the compulsory marriage of Germans before their 20th year is passed, according to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Amsterdam.

Final assistance would be granted by the state, according to this plan, which provides penalties for those failing to comply. Provision also is made for the punishment of married couples

who remain childless.

A report from German sources shows a fall in the birth rate in Germany during 1915-17 equivalent to the loss of 1,000,000 infants. Forty per cent fewer births occurred in 1916 than in 1913. These figures are compared with a decrease of 10 per cent in the birth rate in England and Wales.

The infantile death rate in Germany has been kept well down, but reports show it is 50 per cent higher than in England and Wales.
