RAILROADS TO EXPEND LARGE SUM THIS YEAR

EXPENDITURES OUTLINED UNDER GOVERNMENT OPERATION ARE NEARLY BILLION—HALF IS FOR IMPROVEMENTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Railroads under government operation this year will spend nearly a billion dollars for additions, betterments and equipment, or approximately three times as much as in any one of the last three years.

Total capital expenditures approved by the railroad administration, as announced, are \$937,961,318. Of this sum \$460,071,000 will be spent for additions and betterments, such as stations and other property improvements; \$477,889,000 for equipment—cars and locomotives already ordered thru the railroad administration, and \$18,203,000 for track extensions.

The figures disclose Director McAdoo's determination to let the railroads make many improvements which they had neglected during the last three years, and postponing all possible projects requiring big expenditures. It also is shown that the railroad is not encouraging many extensions of lines during the war emergency, and in some cases projects already under way have been discontinued.

The city plowed and harrowed the cemetery and river bank land, and is furnishing fertilizer to all who ask it. More than 190 acres has been parcelled out to persons who promise to use it to the utmost for production of vegetables.

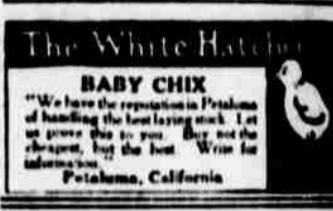
