# Stupendous Amount of War Insurance Written

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—More than \$16,000,000,000 insurance on the lives of more than 1,800,000 soldiers and sailors already has been written by the bureau of war risk insurance. That is said to be more insurance, all written since the middle of last October, than is today on the books of the twenty largest life insurance companies in the world. All kinds of problems have been met with in achieving this gigantic task, according to information furnished to congress by Thomas B. Love, assistant secretary of the treasury, in charge of the bureau, and other officials.

The war risk law provided for payment of family allowances and allotments and for administration of a compensation insurance law applicable to 2,000,000 risks and for the writing of this insurance on the lives of a possible 2,000,000 soldiers and sailors. The applications for allowances and allotments of the soldier's or sailor's pay had to be obtained from the ends of the earth to which those in war service

Notice Inviting Bids for installing Sewer Main

Bids will received by the Common Council up to and including the 20th day of May, at 5 o'clock p. m., for installing a six-inch sewer main in Fairview Addition "one" and "two," between the points named as follows:

Beginning at the intersection (center of intersection) of Delta street and the alley separating Fairview Addition No. 1 from Fairview Addition No. 2, running thence south thru the center of said alley to Upham street; thence to a connection with the manhole at the center of the intersection of Upham and Prospect streets; beginning again at center of intersection of said alley and Fulton street, and running thence west on Fulton street to the west boundary line of Oregon avenue, terminating in a manhole to be installed at said last mentioned point.

The main is to be installed under the direction and supervision of the city engineer, and will include the placing of Y's and manholes and lamp-holes as he may direct and order.

The city will furnish 600 feet of six-inch vitrified sewer pipe. The successful bidder to furnish balance of pipe required. The total length of main to be installed being 1,370 feet.

The installation to be completed within thirty days from the date of entering into bond and contract for its installation.

A bond of \$500 will be required from the successful bidder.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check to the amount of 10 per cent of bid, to be forfeited by successful bidder in the event of failure to enter into contract and bond with the city council within five days after award.
