Enemy Is Now Planning Substitute Exhibition

AMSTERDAM, May 21.—Plans have been formed to open a "Substitute Exhibition of the Central Empires" at Vienna in May. The organizers are the people's food bureau of Austria, the industrial unions and several of the great war companies concerned in the manufacture of substitute textiles, oils, fats, coffee and tobacco. About half the exhibition is to be devoted to the food department, where model kitchens will give demonstrations of substitute foods and the use of refuse. The exhibition is known in Austria by the name "Ema," this being a shortening of the official title, Ersatzmittel-ausstellung.

Huns Would Alienate Belgians' Allegiance

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—From a Belgian who has escaped into England after three years of captivity in German prison camps, the Belgian legation here has received interesting details of the clumsy efforts of the German conquerors to alienate the Belgians of Flemish extraction from their countrymen of Walloon descent, as practiced among Belgian prisoners in Germany. The project, which has been described as stupidly conceived and executed, had its birth, the advisors say, in the dreams of the pan-Germans who would set up in northern Belgium a Flemish state that would assume the status of a German protectorate. The first advances were made toward the Belgians of Flemish extraction confined in the prison camps. They were segregated and forwarded to other prison centers, where they were treated with some degree of kindness in an effort to win their support in establishing the new state. All measures calculated to win over the prisoners failed miserably, said the legation's informant, and the groups remained indissolubly Belgian.

Miss Alice Joyce, who will be seen as the heroine in "Richard the Brason" the Greater Vitaphone Blue Ribbon feature, which will be the attraction at the Temple tonight, has been doing her "bit" in more ways than one since the United States entered the war. When the Liberty Loan was announced she again came to the front. She not only purchased a block of bonds herself, but organized a Liberty Loan club at the studio, and caused scores of her associates to invest in the bonds.

"Should large landholders be compelled to look after the welfare of those working under them?" This question is raised in "A Magdalene of the Hills," the five-act Metro-Rolle production, with Mabel Taliaferro as star, which will be seen at the Orpheus tonight and tomorrow. In the play Herbert Grayson, a wealthy New Yorker, has large timber holdings in a Southern state. He will not have schools on his land, preferring to seek profit by the ignorance of the natives. A mountain youth who is suspected of having set fire to one of Grayson's mills is killed while resisting arrest, and his sister vows vengeance on his slayers. The play shows the life of Southern mountain dwellers and the barriers existing between them and wealthy people whom they suspect and despise because of misunderstanding bred by caste.
