THE VOTES CAST FOR SIXTEEN MEN IN DIFFERENT PRECINCTS. MUST BE DECIDED AT TIME OF ORGANIZATION

The following have been elected as members of the Republican County Central Committee from the several precincts:

Jory; Mt. Laki, T. N. Case; Pine Grove, D. Ellis Young; Plevna, C. H. DeLap; Merrill, Fred Peterson; Malin, C. Bailey; Poe Valley, Wm. Griffith; Dairy, H. S. Oden; Klamath Lake, Frank Courtade; Lost River, F. J. Bowne; Odell, E. C. Rourke; Wood River, E. M. Loeffer; Hildebrand, J. G. Wight.

The votes in several of the precincts resulted in a tie, and the result will have to be determined at the time of the organization of the committee. There is a tie in Precinct No. 3 between R. H. Dunbar, L. F. Wilkins, C. C. Low, B. W. Gowen and W. H. A. Rorer. S. E. Martin and C. M. Ramsby are tied in Precinct 4, and C. K. Brandenburg and R. A. Emmitt each received six votes in Precinct No. 5. In Tule Lake Precinct J. H. Hobbs, G. H. Carleton and E. M. Bubb are tied, while R. C. Cowley and Geo. W. Noble Sr. of Langell Valley have an equal number of votes.

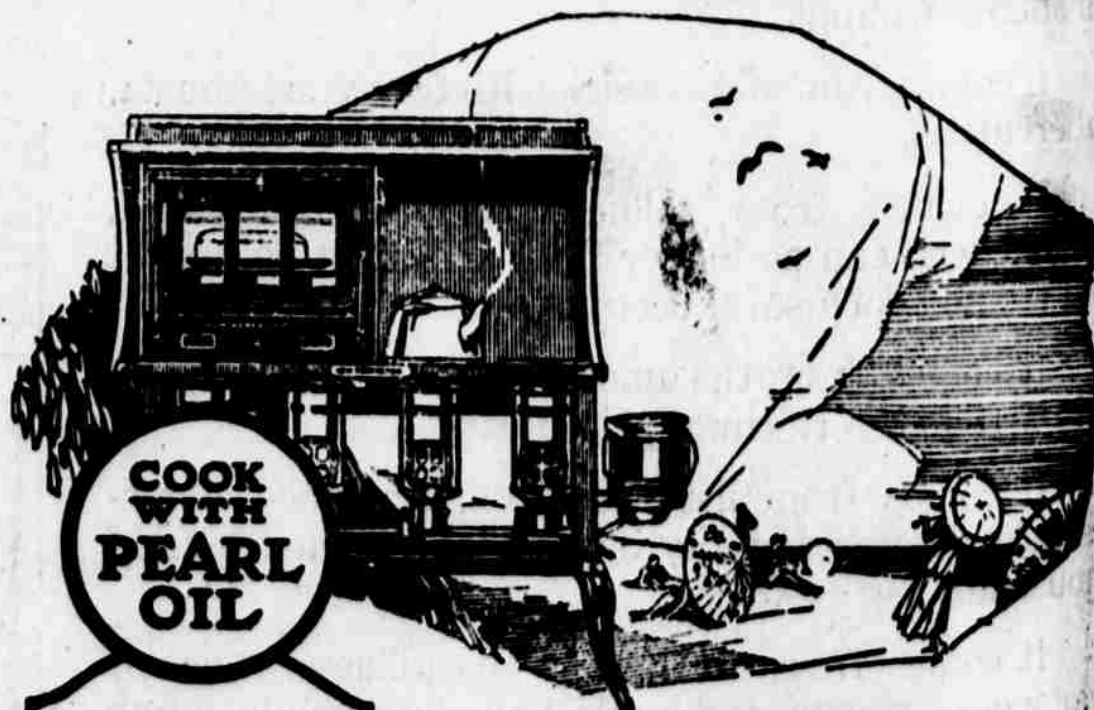
