**California Schools to
Stop Teaching German**

SACRAMENTO, May 22.—The California state board of education has voted to discontinue the study of the German language in the high schools of the state. The action of the board was not intended to apply to the present school term, members of the board said, but will become effective on and after July next.

Vassar Professor Held**

Karl Rodiger, said to be a lieutenant commander in the German navy, who came to the United States in January, 1917, and is believed to have handled most of the German spy funds in this country, has been taken into custody by the federal authorities at New York City. Miss Agathe Wilhelmina Richter, who has been a professor of German at the famous Vassar College for women at Poughkeepsie on the Hudson River, was also detained by the federal authorities. They believe she had spread German propaganda.

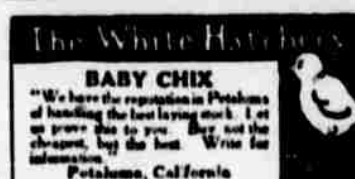
