America Given Credit For Saving the Allies

LONDON, May 28.—"Is it realized by the people of this country that America has already saved us from capitulating to the enemy?" asks a special writer for one of London's big dailies. "Either," the writer continues, "we should have been forced into this surrender with our armies unbroken and our munitions of war unexhausted, or we should at this moment be struggling to live and work and fight on one-third of our present rations."

The food supplies being sent by the United States to its allies represents, it is pointed out, "the kindly, difficult and entirely willing self-sacrifice of a whole nation, the vast majority working people."

America, the article concludes, has answered England's appeal "in a manner which marks her out as one of the greatest moral forces in the world. It should be known out there, in the farm houses and cottages of the American continent, that the people of this country, tightening their belts and confronting the future with an indestructible confidence, are mindful of America's self-sacrifice—self-sacrifice which will save the world."

Oregon Pine Forests Conserve Snow Water

PORTLAND, May 28.—Studies carried on by the forest service during the past three years, in the Cascade mountain region of Oregon and Washington, show quite conclusively that the forests covering these mountains have an important influence in slowing up the melting of the large quantities of snow which accumulate in these watersheds, according to a report completed by District Forester G. H. Cecil here.

This holding back of the rapid melting of snow, which takes place every spring, makes it possible for the irrigated valleys to use much more snow water than otherwise would be possible. In many parts of the Cascades considerable more than half the annual rainfall is in the form of snow, and the agricultural interests lying below these mountains are largely dependent upon snow water for the early portion of the growing season. In a number of the irrigated districts this snow water is not at present stored by reservoirs, and consequently any influence which results in lengthening the time in which snow water enters the water courses is a real benefit to the farmer who depends on this water.

The study was made chiefly on the Deschutes National forest in Oregon and the Columbia and Wenatchee National forests in Washington, in different parts of the Columbia River basin, and it was found that snow remained in the forests an average of seventeen days longer than in the bare open places. The average amount of snow which was still in the forest when the snow cover in the open had entirely disappeared, was not insignificant; the average for three seasons showing this conserved residue to amount to almost one-third of the winter's snow fall.

The efficacy of forest as a conservator of snow and a retarder of its melting was found to increase with the density of the timber. The maintenance, therefore, of the maximum tree cover will enable the forest to exert the greatest possible influence as a snow retainer.

Important Facts For Draft Registrants

PORTLAND, May 28.—Wednesday, June 5th, is a date of great importance to every man in the United States who has attained the age of 21 years since registration day June 5th, one year ago. For on this coming June 5th will be held another registration day, on which every man who has passed his 21st birthday since last June 5th must register with his local draft board.

This applies to non-citizens as well as to citizens. No man who comes within the age limit is exempted from registering, unless he is already in the military or naval service of the United States.

And men 21 years old who for any reason have been discharged from the military or naval service must register on June 5th.

The registration will be conducted by the local draft boards throughout the United States. Each draft board is required to post publicly the location of its registration place, and men 21 years old must present themselves there on June 5th for registration.

The registration places will open on registration day at 7 o'clock in the morning, and will be open until 9 o'clock that night.

No excuse will be accepted for failure to register. The burden of informing himself of the time and place for registration is by law placed on the registrant himself. Failure to register is punishable by imprisonment up to one year in jail.

Attempts to evade registration will bring disaster to the evader. All city, county, state and United States peace officers have been specifically directed to assist in bringing about a complete registration of men 21 years old, and to examine the registration lists and report immediately to the federal authorities the names of any persons liable to registration known by them to have failed to register.

Men who are too ill to appear at the registration place in person must send some competent person to the local board to obtain a registration card with authority to fill it out. This card when filled must be mailed or taken in person to the local board in time to be filed on registration day, June 5th. Provision is also made for registration by mail of men 21 years old who will unavoidably be absent from their home jurisdiction on registration day.

All such persons should proceed immediately, without waiting for registration day, to the local board nearest to the place in which they happen to be, and have their registration cards made out by this board.

The card must then be mailed by the registrant, together with a self-addressed and stamped envelope for return of a registration certificate, to the registrant's own local board.

As this registration card must reach the local board by June 5th, men 21 years old who will be absent from their home jurisdiction on June 5th should make haste now to have their registration cards filled out, so they can mail

The War Department has issued the following official warning to all men coming within the 21-year-old age limit:

"Caution—All male persons, citizens of the United States, and all male persons residing within the United States, who have, since the 5th day of June, 1917, and on or before the day set for registration by the president's proclamation (this coming June 5th), attained the age of 21 years, must register. The only exceptions are persons in the military or naval service of the United States, which includes all officers and enlisted men of the regular army, the navy, the marine corps, and the national guard and naval militia, while in the service of the United States, and officers in the officers' reserve corps and enlisted men in the enlisted reserve corps while in active service."
