

PAPER IS MADE FROM SAWDUST NOW

LONDON, May 28.—Experiments in making paper from sawdust which were undertaken in 1916, have been revived. Certain difficulties connected with the conversion of sawdust into wood pulp have been overcome, and as

the supply of sawdust is unlimited, it is hoped to remove part of the difficulty of finding an adequate supply of news print paper. The paper controller is assisting, and a mill has been started in Scotland to turn out 300 tons of paper a week from sawdust. The process will shortly be extended to other mills, it is announced.

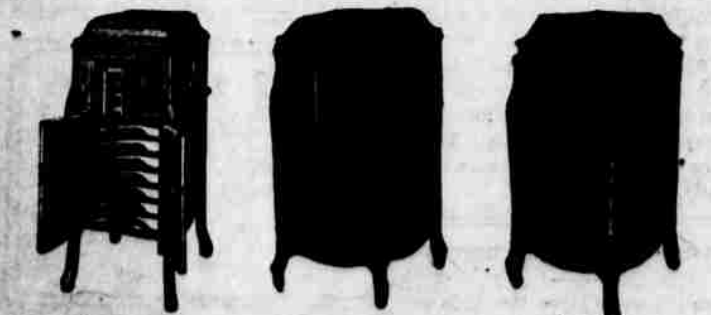
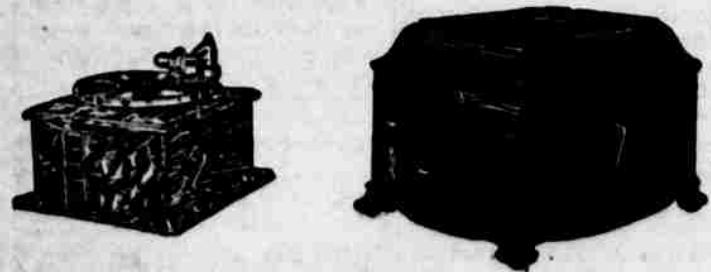
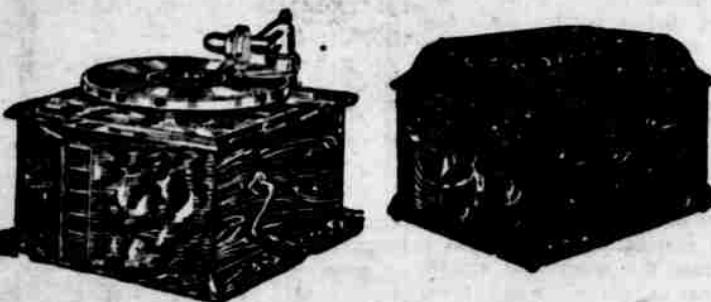
