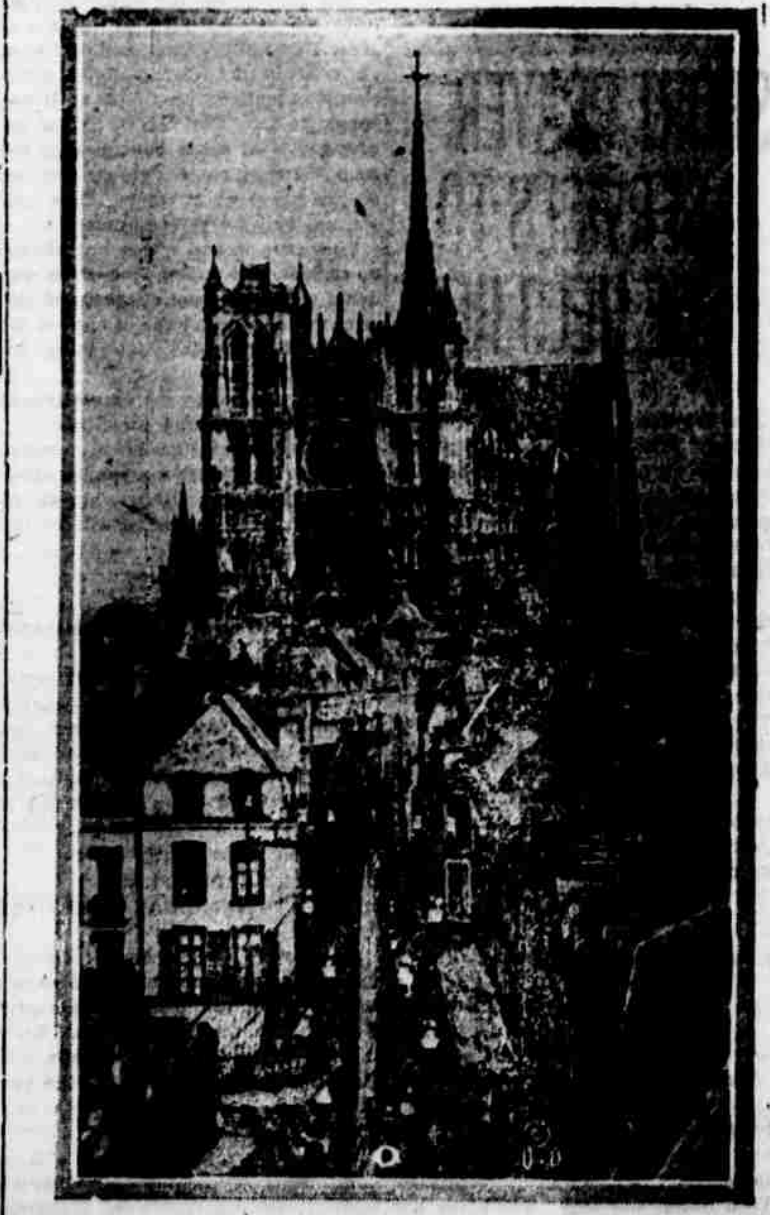

Women Wanted for Work at Washington

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 29.—More and more, as the war progresses, is the government depending upon women to perform the tremendously increased volume of work in the civil branches. The force of civilian employes in Washington, D. C., increased from 30,000 to approximately 70,000 during the first year of our participation in the war. Of this increase in government offices and establishments outside of Washington is less proportion, for the reason that the greatest expansion in the field has been in the large manufacturing plants of the war and navy departments, where thousands of mechanics and laborers are employed in shipbuilding and in manufacturing ordnance and other war material. Women are not available for employment in trades positions to any great extent, but their services are being utilized in every way that is practicable.
