

Two Candidates to Succeed Redmond

The two most conspicuous candidates for leadership of the nationalist party in the house of commons since John E. Redmond died, are Joseph Devlin and John Dillon. Mr. Devlin is from West Belfast, and has been a prominent member of parliament for some years. Mr. Dillon now represents County Mayo, and has been in parliament since 1880.

German Alien Females Register June 23

1—Persons required to register—All natives, citizens, denizens, or subjects of the German empire or of the imperial German government, being females of the age of 14 years and upwards, now within the United States, and not actually naturalized as American citizens, are required to register as German alien females.

2—Female natives, citizens, denizens or subjects of the Austro-Hungarian empire are not required to register under the president's proclamation of April 18, 1918, nor under these regulations, unless they come within the provisions of the preceding paragraph.

3—In cities or municipalities which had, by the federal census of 1910, a population of 5,000 or over, the registration will take place in the police stations; in all other communities, known as non-urban areas, the registration will take place in the post-offices.

In this community the postmaster will act as registration officer, and he will be furnished with copies of the general rules and regulations concerning the registration and such further instructions from time to time as may be issued by the attorney general governing registration procedure.

Persons required to register should understand that by so doing they are giving proof of their peaceful dispositions and their intention to conform to the laws of the United States.

Each registrant should read carefully the form of registration affidavit handed her and ask the registration officer for explanation on all points not clear to her before attempting to fill out the blanks, and registration officers are instructed to give registrants all possible aid in the way of explanation and advice.

Each registrant is required to furnish four unmounted photographs of herself, not larger than 3x3 inches in size, on thin paper, with light background. The photographs shall be of the shoulders and full face, without hat or other head covering. All four photographs should be signed by registrant across the face of the photographs so as not to obliterate the features, if the applicant is able to write.

Three blank forms of registration affidavits must be completely filled out by the registrant or her representative, and must be presented personally to the registration officer, and be signed and sworn to by the registrant in the presence of and before the registration officer. A registration card will be issued to each registrant, not at the time of registration, but between July 7th and July 11th, and she should be notified by the postmaster to call at the postoffice where registered for the card.

Men Who Can't Fight Put at Useful Work

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—Two hundred thousand men of draft age, who, because of minor physical defects, have been held by examining surgeons over the country for limited service, are to be employed in producing or handling equipment for the army. Provost Marshal General Crowder has announced that the army staff corps will utilize the services of these registrants, and thus release fighting men for the front line.

General Crowder has issued the first call under the new plan. Orders went forth to governors of states for upwards of 8,000 men for service in the spruce production for airplanes. The men will be allowed to volunteer until June 6th. After that date a report will be made to the provost marshal general, and if there are not sufficient volunteers, allotments will be made to the various states to be filled by involuntary inductment. Some 10,000 men of the army are now engaged in getting out spruce timber in the Northwest, and the signal corps constantly is increasing this number. Consequently the sending of the new men to this field will constitute no new policy and, it is understood, that it has no relation to complaints that I. W. W. have retarded the output of spruce.

GEN. VON GALLWITZ

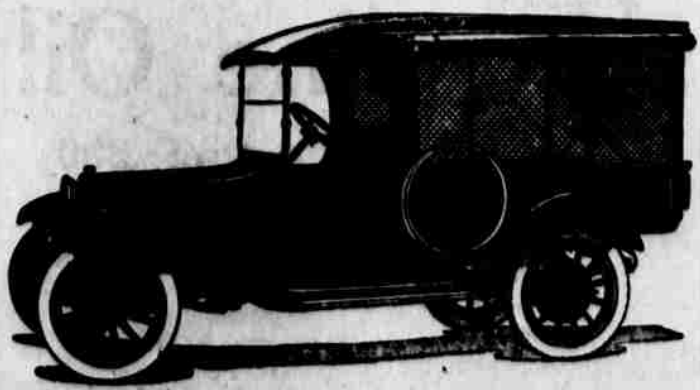
