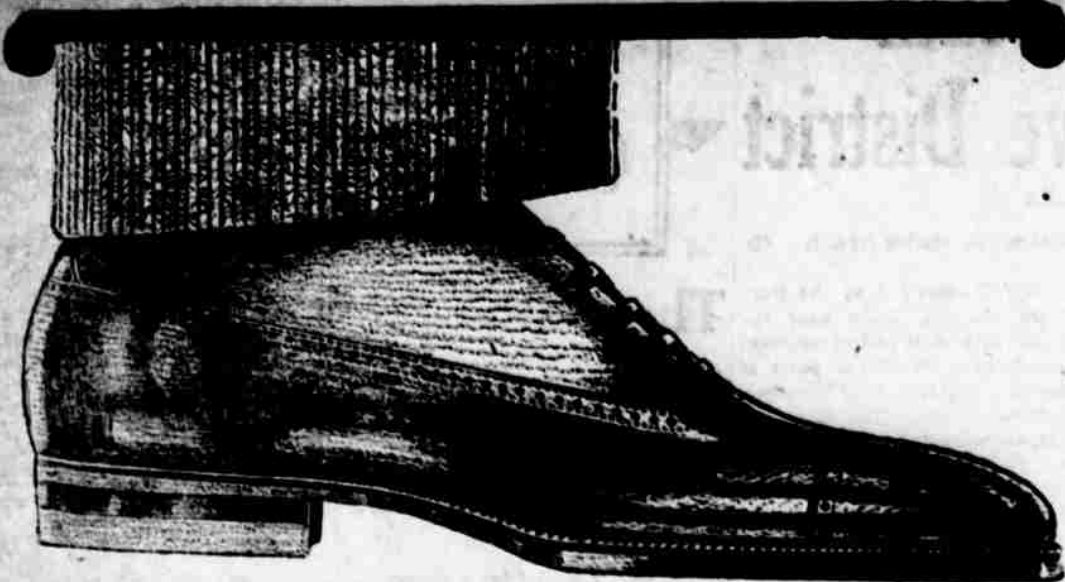

Big Drive for Nurses Commences Today

Office of the Surgeon General of the United States Army:

The American Red Cross, Washington, D. C., June 3.

"I am informed that on this date it is the intention of the American Red Cross to start a drive for nurses in the army. The American Red Cross is a great recruiting agency for army nurses, and thru this agency I wish to appeal to the nurses of the country to enroll for service in the nurses' corps of the army. The need of a great number of nurses is acute, and any assistance the American Red Cross can render this department in obtaining for the army nurse corps the number of nurses required will be a genuine service to the country. To supply this acute need for army nurses reported by Surgeon General Gorgas and to enroll additional nurses for the navy nurse corps, the Amer-

ican Red Cross will start today an intensive campaign of ten days to enroll graduates nurses eligible for military service and to encourage high school and college graduates to become student nurses in the army school of nursing and in municipal and other hospitals. In view of this need for nurses the director of nursing of the American Red Cross has advanced this drive from June 10th to today, the primary purpose of which is to add before January 1st more than 15,000 additional nurses to the army and navy nurse corps, which already have secured more than 10,000 military nurses thru the agency of the American Red Cross. This is believed to be the largest number of graduate nurses ever mobilized for any army. Every division of the American Red Cross, all committees on American Red Cross nursing service and every American Red Cross Chapter throughout the United States will have an active part in this campaign to enroll nurses within ten days, beginning today.

Aeronautics Branch Needs Skilled Men

The provost marshal general advises that the military aeronautics branch is in need of certain skilled men. Men qualified for special or limited military service only will be used under this call. Men qualified for general military service are not desired for this service.

Repeated requests have been received by the provost marshal general for an opportunity for limited service men to enter the service. These men will be engaged in spruce production work for aeroplanes, which is interesting and healthful work, and should appeal strongly to qualified registrants. The provost marshal requests that the

widest publicity be given to this call, and that technically qualified registrants be urged to present themselves to their local boards for listing.

The following types of men are desired: Locomotive engineers, firemen, railroad grade foremen, railroad track foremen, wooden bridge carpenters, locomotive repairmen, telephone linemen, surveyors or railroad instrument men, telegraphers, draftsmen, pile driver foremen, stationary engineers for diesel engines, steam shovel operators, carpenters, steam fitters, electricians, auto mechanics, auto drivers, cooks, clerks, railroad brakemen, railroad conductors and a large number of laborers.

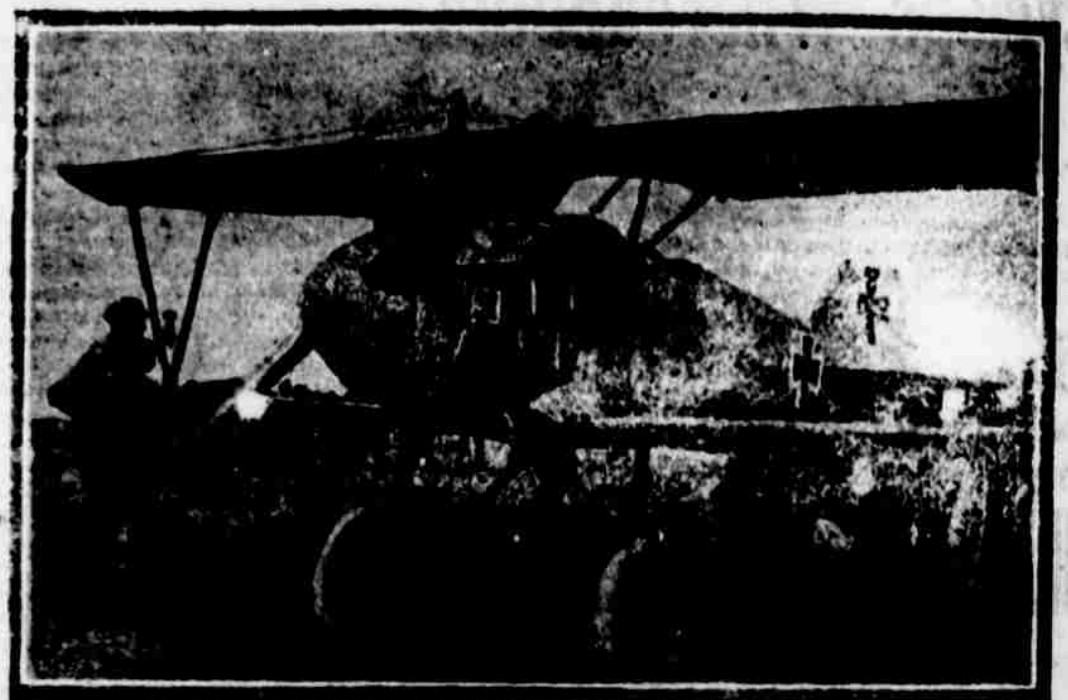
LOCAL BOYS MEET DEFEAT AT MERRILL
