The Chimney, Bearfoot cave, ice
cave, Skull cave and Lava River
cave. One new cave was explored by
some of the more adventurous and
courageous spirits. The first lady over

time. Having to crawl 150 feet over
an incline and then down onto a floor
of solid ice. Several other young
ladies made the attempt later and
were nearly thru, when one the num-
ber set fire to her hair with the candle
she was carrying. After the flames

thing worse happened. Pictures were

taken by various ones. A rattlesnake
was killed, and a few trophies, consist-
ing of arrow heads and the like, spec-
imens of lava, bones and horns, were
secured. When the time came to re-

around Dry Lake and Tule Lake.

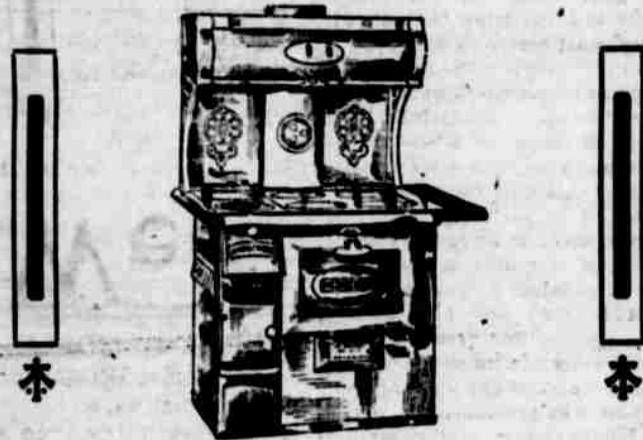
