DIG TRIBAL MEETING ON JULY FOURTH

APPLICATIONS OF INDIANS FOR MEMBERSHIP IN KLAMATH TRIBE, ONE IMPORTANT MATTER TO BE CONSIDERED

At the time of their regular Fourth of July celebration here this year, a general meeting under the leadership of the tribal council will be held, at which various matters affecting the welfare of the Indians will be discussed. All applications for enrollment on the rolls of the Klamath tribe which have been made since the tribal wealth in timber has been estimated, will be carefully estimated. These are reported to number about 100. Applicants will have to clearly show their identity before being admitted, it is declared.
