They do not ask full pardon but merely a parole for the period of the war, promising to return to serve out their sentence "if they survive the conflict. The matter is in the hands of the city officials.

## Treasury Certificates May Be Paid on Taxes

PORTLAND, Or., June 10.—A telegram received from the commissioner of internal revenue, in Washington, by Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue here, says: "It is of the utmost importance to the financial arrangements of the government that taxpayers who have purchased treasury certificates of indebtedness maturing June 25, 1918, should use such certificate in payment of their taxes and should not present the certificates for payment in cash. You must accept all certificates maturing June 25th, 1918, tendered in payment of taxes and do all you can to induce taxpayers to tender certificates instead of cash."

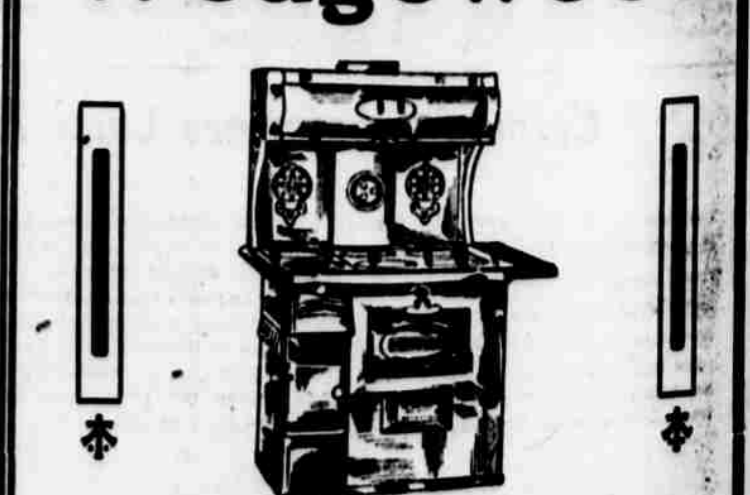
