DR. LYMAN ABBOTT

Dr. Lyman Abbott, who succeeded Henry Ward Beecher in the pastorate of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, and now editor of the Outlook, told the members of the League to Enforce Peace that he would not pray for the Kaiser. He said this in answer to a statement by the Archbishop of York. He said he would offer a prayer for ignorant and unwitting criminals, but he would not offer it for "the Kaiser and his pals."

FORTY-FIVE OBJECTORS SENTENCED

FORTY-FIVE MEN WHO REFUSE TO WEAR UNIFORM OF THE UNITED STATES ARE COURT MARTIALED

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 11.—Sentences of life imprisonment were imposed by court martial yesterday on forty-five "conscientious objectors" who refused to wear army uniforms. The sentences were reduced later to 25 years by Brigadier General O'Neil who reviewed their records. The men will be sent to prison immediately.
