State Men Get Chance For Military Training

The University of Oregon will conduct a military encampment for four weeks beginning Monday, June 24. The work will be modeled on that of the famous Plattsburg officers' training camp. Lieutenant Colonel John Leader, who was commander of the Royal Irish Rifles at the battle of the Somme, together with an American officer to be assigned by the war department will be in charge. Anyone capable of doing the work is eligible to attend and no enlistment or promise to enlist will be required. The following advantages are to be anticipated:

First: Men expecting to be drafted will find that such preliminary training is likely to secure for them early promotion to the position of non-commissioned officers, and appointment to army officers' training camps where they may earn commissions.

Second: Men satisfactorily completing the course may be included in one of the quotas to be assigned to the University for appointment directly to officers' training camps where they can earn commissions.

Third: Men satisfactorily completing the course will be qualified to organize and command Home Guard companies. High school teachers attending will be qualified to introduce military training into their high schools.

Fourth: University, college and high school students taking the work will be qualified for promotion in the R. O. T. C. organizations and in high school training units next fall.

Fifth: All attending may expect great physical benefit from a vacation spent in this way under ideal conditions of climate together with carefully directed physical and mental activity of a highly advantageous type. Those desiring to may take advantage without extra cost of the University summer school.

Sixth: Preparation of this kind is an act of patriotism in the present international situation, as no one knows what he may be called upon to do in the next few years.

The cost will be nominal. The rations and fees for the entire four weeks will amount to \$40. Each man will be expected to bring two blankets and some kind of uniform. Those not already supplied with uniforms are advised to acquire "coveralls" trench uniforms at a cost of about \$7. The guns and equipment of the University battalion will be available and the men will be housed in the University dormitories in the gymnasium and in tents.

New Altitude Test For American Airmen

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 11.—By a "rebreathing machine" here, the first of its kind to be established by the United States government or any of its allies anywhere, aviators flying under the Stars and Stripes henceforth will be classified according to their ability to thrive in high altitudes.

The machine is in a research laboratory at Barron aviation field, and is in charge of Lieutenant G. H. Hanson, F. W. Thomas and James Blair, who arrived in Fort Worth recently from Mineola, N. Y. It produces all the sensations of ascending and descending and has been in use by the German air service, it is said, for five years.

Henceforth, no pilot from any of the local fields will be assigned to active duty overseas until he has passed the tests of the contrivance and been

classified according to his ability to withstand altitude fatigue. Experience has taught that many air casualties are due to this fatigue. One man will be so affected that he will faint. Another will go along with his flying mechanically and with his mind so dulled that he cannot plan or execute an attack on an enemy. Still another will become stupid and his nerves will not react to the excitement of battle.

The pilots will be divided into three classes. In the first class will be placed airmen who are never affected by altitude fatigue and who can ascend and fight anywhere their planes will mount.

In the next class will be those whose mental faculties are dulled by high altitude.

And in the last, or third class, will be those who faint under the stress.
