GERMAN PRISONERS ARE

LONDON, June 12.—Two Germans who had escaped from a prison camp near London were walking along a road when they encountered a boy with a shot gun. From a newspaper picture he recognized them as fugitive enemies and, although his gun wasn't loaded, he forced the two to walk ahead of him to the nearest police station. The boy's name is Thomas Gibson. He is 17 years old and small for his age.

SOLDIER CHARGED WITH
MURDER HELD IN JAIL

GLENDIVE, Mont., June 12.—Joseph Fennell did not leave with his company when the local contingent departed for Camp Lewis. He is in jail charged with having murdered Johann Gejewake, a rancher, in a quarrel over the refusal of Mrs. Gejewake to permit her 15-year old daughter to accompany Fennell to a farewell dance to the soldiers. Fennell, 23 years old, was a rancher before he was drafted.

Americans Greatly
Admired In London

LONDON, May 5.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The high esteem in which England holds the American soldier and sailor is reflected almost daily by the London press. One paper devotes a long article to American qualities as exhibited by Fireman M—, champion light heavyweight boxer, of the U. S. navy. The writer watched him in a contest with the champion of the British Grand Fleet.

"One was forcibly reminded," he says, "how exceedingly impolite we are on the surface—and how thoroughly good natured. The latter quality was responsible for the applause which greeted the appearance of the American—applause far louder than that accorded to our own champion."

"It swelled to a roar as he sprang upon the stage where the ring was fixed. It is not the custom in the British navy for even a popular favorite to acknowledge the cheers which greet him. The correct procedure is for him to dive into his corner where his seconds immediately surround him and hide him from view."

"Not so the American. He merely did what he was accustomed to at home—paused, a solitary figure in a well-worn dressing gown, and bowed—not as an hotel manager or a shop-walker bows, but with little, shy bows which were quite delightful to those of us who knew something of his battling reputation."

612 K. K. K. STORE.Finishing School Has
New Target for Flyers

LAKE CHARLES, La., June 12.—Aviators from training camps throughout the country are completing their education in aerial gunnery at the new finishing school near here. From sunrise to sunset the planes are darting here and there, sometimes near the earth and again at high altitudes and the rattle of machine guns is almost continuous.

The targets at the first school of the kind to be established in the United States are reproductions of German "taube" airplanes placed on the surface of the lake with a black cross painted thereon to represent the pilot, the principal mark for the gunners. The students easily discern the striking of bullets on the water and are able to correct their fire almost instantly if the shots go wide. The results, instructors declare, are more than gratifying but just what records the young flyers have made is information withheld from the public.

The training in gunnery is as complete as it humanly possible to make it. Before being sent to the camp the students are required to undergo a course of ground schooling at Gerstner field, near here. From Gerstner

field they go to the lake and in classes of thirty are put to work on the "taube" and a small aerial target released at an altitude of about 3,000 feet. The students are graded according to their proficiency in firing and when they make the percentage of hits required are discharged from the school.

Both the small machines, carrying only a pilot, and the larger planes, with a pilot and observer, are in use at the school.

Pugilist Teaches Bayonet
Boxing to Yankee Marines

Benny Leonard entertained several thousand marines and sailors at the Mare Island Marine Barracks recently. The champion boxed 10 spirited rounds and put more "pep" into the bouts than he did when he boxed Johnny McCarthy at the Civic Auditorium in San Francisco for the Red Cross benefit.

The event was slated to go on at 2 o'clock but the boys turned out in throngs long before the scheduled time, and when the champion made his appearance he received a reception that he will long remember; it was several moments before "Benny" could quiet the boys, and when he did, he gave them some good "dope" on the fine points of the game, and finished by saying that he was glad to do anything for the boys who beat the same title as he himself does, "FIRST TO FIGHT."

After the bouts the champion formed a class of about 250 Marines and gave them an hour's drill with bayonets and explained to them how necessary it was for a man to be a good boxer to fight successfully with the bayonet, and how similar the movements of the two are.

Among the officers who watched Leonard in action were Colonel Lincoln Karmony, Major Wm. Small and Captain McCluskey of the San Francisco recruiting office.
