

Nation Wide Drive to Conserve Child Life

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—The Washington authorities report that five millions of children under six years of age will be weighed and measured in the nation wide drive to conserve child life in the United States. Men, women, physicians and nurses who are giving their time and experience to the movement are willing to take Washington's word for it that there are 10,000,000. From every center where the children are being examined and their records filed comes the report that they are swamped by a flood of youngsters whose parents are anxious to have them examined.

"The success of the drive is exceeding our most sanguine expectations," said Dr. Adelaide Brown, who is at the head of the work in California. "It is most encouraging to see that intelligent and well to do parents are bringing their children and are anxious to find how nearly their offspring approximate the standards which have been set. The interest will be sustained for the reason that further examinations of these same children will be made next October, and then again during next year, and comparisons made of the progress of each child during the intervals. The mother

who finds out that her child is not making the progress that it should will be told the reasons and what she should do. A little advice and information along these lines may mean the difference between a healthy, robust child or an ailing one. "It is our hope that this movement will inaugurate permanent centers of this kind all over the country where young mothers may come and have the progress of their children noted in a scientific way. It is through ignorance for their proper care that many children die who otherwise might grow up to be useful citizens. It is this preventable wastage of child life that we are after. Minor ailments which might escape the notice of parents can thus be taken in hand while they still are inconsequential. To neglect them might mean a chronic trouble in the future. SECRET LETTER SHOWS CHANGE IN WAR POLICY

WHEN ROUMANIA'S SUPPORT WAS WITHDRAWN FROM THE ALLIES LETTER SAID IT IS TIME FOR KINGS TO STICK TOGETHER

LONDON, June 12.—(Associated Press.)—A private secret letter to King Ferdinand of Roumania from Emperor Charles of Austria Hungary in February, marked the turning point of Roumania's participation in the war and changed Ferdinand from an ardent supporter of the war against Germany into a vacillating opportunist.

The letter said "This is the time when kings should stick together," and pointed out the danger to monarchies from the sweeping waves of Socialism and Bolshevism. A certain high official told the contents to an American minister and Associated Press correspondent at Jashia.

Where U-Boats Sank American Vessels; Harbors Closed by Orders from Washington



Most of the vessels shelled or torpedoed by German submarines were off the New Jersey coast at the time. One attack was seventy miles southeast from Atlantic Highlands, which is on the south side of New York harbor, and the other was 160 miles southeast of the same point. Early reports indicated the submarines had

not operated in the Atlantic lane to Europe, which was considerably north of their scene of destruction. The map shows the harbors of Boston, Provincetown on Cape Cod, and Newport and New York, which were ordered closed by orders from Washington till the U-boat menace was over.

Drought of Two Years Broken In West Texas

DALLAS, Tex., June 12.—The long drought which has prevailed in West Texas for two or more years, causing little less than disaster to the cattle raising industry in Texas, has been partly if not wholly broken. Three good soaking rains fell in that district within the first seventeen days of May. Grass is now coming out, water holes have been partly filled and a general spirit of optimism prevails with the cattle men, many of

them staked fortunes on the effort to hold out. Ranch men who had waited from month to month for the rains shipped thousands of heads of cattle out of this district to other ranges. Many dollars were spent by the stockmen on feed to keep alive those few cattle that remained on the range. They declare that had the rain been delayed another six weeks, the plains would have practically been deserted of cattle.
