6 COUNTY MEN FOR AVIATION WORK CALLED

The following telegram has been received by the local exemption board in regard to the call for men qualified for special or limited military service.

There has been one volunteer for this branch from here so far. R. H. Kelly has volunteered as an auto driver.

"Induction call upon your board is hereby announced as follows: Number 719, under which your allotment is six laborers to be entrained for the Vancouver barracks, Vancouver, Wn., on June 29th. These men are to report to the commanding officer of the Military Aeronautics corps. Only white men and men physically qualified for special or limited service are to be furnished under this call.

"If your allotment under this call is in excess of your volunteers, select in sequence of order numbers sufficient number of qualified men from within class 1 (special or limited service only) to fill your allotment after deducting voluntary inductions. "No man shall be inducted under this call who does not possess technical qualifications or who is not in any other group than that of special or limited military service.

This is the first call to be made for men of limited physical qualifications only, and local boards must understand that this is the only call which can be filled with this type of men.
