A number of inquiries have reached the local exemption board office which indicate that many registrants still believe that Class one-A must be exhausted before Class one-B or any other sub-divisions of Class one may be utilized. For the information of registrants, it is announced that the sub-divisions of Class one in no wise affect the order of liability of registrants, but that such sub-divisions are employed only as a guide in the classification of registrants and that the order of military liability in Class one is determined solely by the registrant's order number.
