PREVENTABLE GRAIN LOSS IN FIELD IS ENORMOUS

Scattering Varieties, Rough Handling, Faulty Threshing and 'Ships' Are Very Expensive.

O. A. C. Experiment Station.—By attention to field conservation Oregon wheat growers may save themselves much money as well as conserve more than a million bushels of wheat. Means of preventing some of these wastes are pointed out

by Prof. Hyslop of the O. A. C. Station as follows:

Grow no-shattering varieties and harvest before unduly ripe. Adjust and run the harvest machinery to take up all the grain, and the threshers to get and save as much as possible. It is not an uncommon sight in Oregon, after the fall rains come, to see enough volunteer wheat growing in the field to represent two bushels of seed to the acre, and to see the strawstacks green and sprouting

grain that was blown over the screens.

The loss of grain due to these causes probably amounts to more than 600,000 thousand bushels per year in Oregon. Careful and free farmers and machine operators will reduce this loss to a minimum. Too high speed of the threshers, too many concaves or irregular feeding will result in much cracked grain that is lost with screening.

A good deal of grain is lost by skipping around the edges, at the

War Savings Day to Be Made Big Success

The National War Savings Committee, which is carrying on, thru its state and local committees, a nationwide campaign to get all the people on or before June 28 to pledge themselves to save to the utmost of their ability and to buy War Savings Stamps with their savings, has given out the following statement:

"Those of us who remain at home while others do the fighting have an ever increasing number of opportunities to do definite and highly important work for our country. We wish to do this work as an expression of the gratitude we feel in being privileged to continue at our usual tasks, to enjoy the loving companionship of our families to meet freely with our friends and neighbors, to enjoy all the securities of life and most of the pleasure and economic privileges of peace times while other men, who have had to put aside all these things, are fighting our battles for us on

corners, and in other places, and much is lost by careless shocking and handling. The mechanical loss is due to inexperienced helpers and some times to attempts to limit production by sabotage.

Taking into account all these losses the estimate of a bushel per acre is conservative. This would mean this year nearly 700,000 bushels in Oregon. When the losses due to over-ripeness of shattering varieties is added the annual loss may be as high as a million. Never before in the history of the United States has need for saving the wheat been so vital.

"Our new opportunity to serve comes as a result of designating June 28 as National War Savings Day, a day on which all men and women and all children of sufficient years to appreciate the day's significance are called upon to pledge themselves to save to the utmost of their ability and conserve all possible labor and materials for the Government, and to buy War Savings Stamps with their savings. "Could any one of us be asked to do less than this? Could any one of us refuse to do nothing a thing to win a war for the world's freedom? Could any one of us put aside this plea for saving while all Europe is crying out in its agony to be released from the clutches of the monster that is befouling all it touches? Could we refuse so simple a thing and at the same time ask other men to give their lives for our own precious lives be spared and our freedom be kept safe from the terrors of the Hun?"

"Our duty is clear, our privilege is great, our sacrifice is little, our work is important.

"National War Savings Day is to be the great rallying day on which everyone in our country is expected to pledge himself or herself to save and economize. This saving and economizing will first of all leave in the markets a greater supply of labor and materials for the use of the Government with which to fight the war. And then the money savings of the individuals are to be invested in War Savings Stamps.

to do is to pledge ourselves to buy at definite periods with our savings a specific amount of War Savings Stamps. The thing to be accomplished is to get subscriptions which will take care during the balance of the present year of the unpaid portion of the \$2,000,000,000 of War Savings Stamps authorized by Congress to be sold during 1918.

"When one stops to think of the matter it is really a small thing to save \$2,000,000,000 in a country of 100,000,000 people. If every one would do his share, it would be necessary for each person to subscribe to only \$20 worth of stamps.

"The duty of us at home is to see to it that the nation mount is subscribed. We must work to that end. We must add to our already great army of war savers. We must make more sacrifices ourselves and urge more sacrifices on others. National War Savings Day MUST be the great success of all of us hope for."
