Huns' Air Losses This Year Are Tremendous

Paris, June 22.—(Via Ottawa.)—Eight hundred and thirty-five German airplanes have been destroyed since January 1 according to an official announcement just made, which tends to prove that the German communiques are not reliable.

when dealing with losses of airplanes.

The statement says that on June 2 the Germans lost 48, while on June 9 and 10 there were 49 of their machines brought down. The British were responsible for the destruction of 33 of those lost on the latter date. The German official statement acknowledged the loss of 10 on June 2 and eight on June 9 and 10.

The monthly losses during the present year follow:

January, France 20 and Germany 18; February, France 18 and Germany 79; March, France 50 and Germany 186; April, France 46 and Germany 126; May, France 60 and Germany 356.
