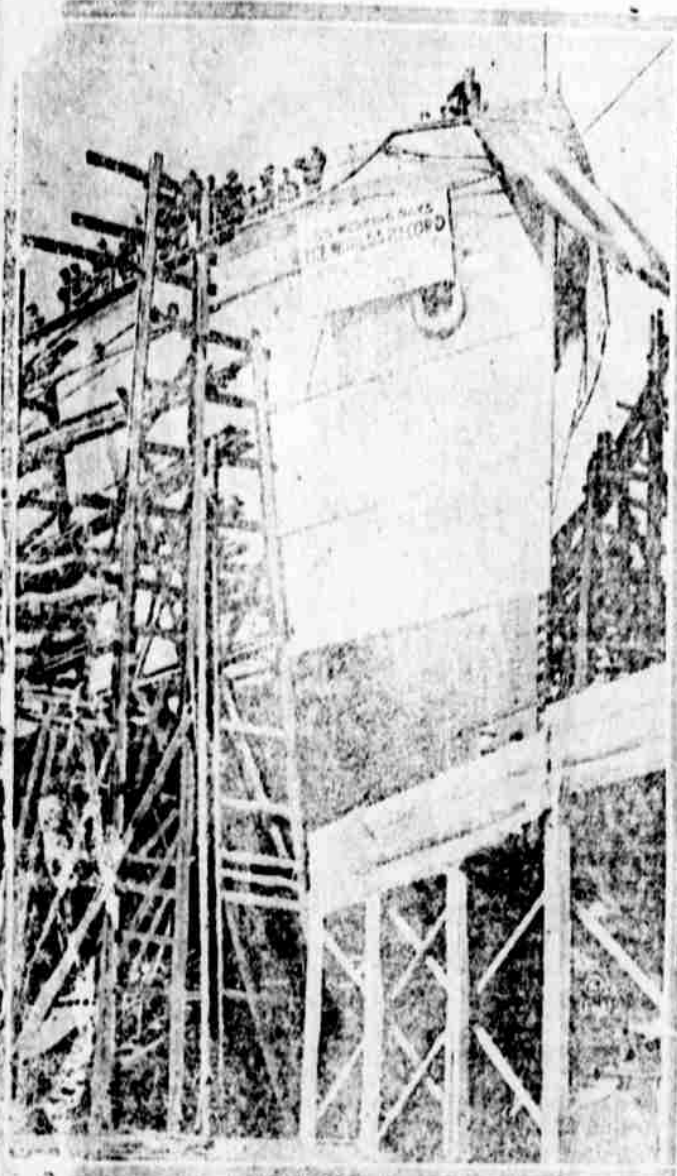


Seattle Ship Which Broke Building Record

PRICES ON MUTTON MAY BE REDUCED

Claiming that the sheep men of the West have a surplus of sheep on their hands today greater than ever before known in the history of the country, E. F. Bigler, representing the Woodward Bennett packing company, says the prices for mutton and lamb will be cut in half by next fall. He says there are six million more sheep in the states of New Mexico, Utah, Arizona, Idaho and Montana now than there were a year ago. The reasons for this surplus are two—first, the conservation of meat in the interest of food saving, and second, the fancy prices paid for wool, enabling the sheep men to multiply their flocks to the limit.

Asked why surplus mutton and beef cannot be packed and sent east and thence "over there" the supposed destination of all conserved meat, Bigler stated that a shortage in refrigerator cars made such shipment almost impossible. The meat that goes to France is packed in Chicago or other eastern centers. We have not the right cars to send it from the West.

Allied Women Work In Sight of German Lines

London, June 24.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—British, American and French women working in the war zone have become "a factor of importance in the organization of victory," writes Sir Harry Johnston, in the Evening News. "There is no parallel," he says, "in the German army to the women's work done with our armies. The women in the German empire are not treated; they are relegated to the home life or to home tasks. They are not fighting with the men at the front as ours are. The German military commanders and the German army are afraid of their women's influence."

One comes well within sight of the German lines, the articles states, before the Allied women working as Young Men's Christian Association helpers, or as Red Cross nurses are lost sight of.

It is difficult to be too enthusiastic over "the glorious army of hospital nurses," and the writer asks "Was ever such devotion shown?" "In the hospitals," he goes on, "one may see acting as mere probationers the daughters and grand-daughters of great and celebrated men, thankful to be employed in housemaid's work while qualified for skilled service. I don't think I encountered one silly woman in the whole of my recent experience in France."

Another question he propounds is, "What has become of women's nerves?" adding "They seem not specially distressed over the drum fire that keeps all but the most tired fighting men awake at night behind the lines. They are no more inclined to faint at the sight of blood or terrible wounds, no more disposed to leave their post of duty even though death may fly round it and over it."

London, June 24.—An order has been issued requiring all street railway companies in Great Britain to reduce their coal consumption by 15 per cent. as compared with that of last year.

Several street railways, including those of Liverpool and Manchester, have decided to adopt the American precedent of running "skip-stop" cars, which omit about half of the customary stops.

Doctors Help Men to Escape Army Service

London, June 24.—Unscrupulous physicians and chemists in London have been operating recently a large school to assist men of military age from avoiding service by the use of drugs. Medical boards before whom men appear for examination for exemption learned some time ago of this practice, taught by heads of the school, and measures have been taken by the police to break up the organization of quacks.

A doctor can produce almost any symptom of disqualification for the army, the heart being the chief organ tampered with, it was learned by the authorities. Use of drugs which affect the heart is more difficult to detect, and because of that fact is the most in demand among "clients."

The fee charged by the quacks is \$50 in most cases, but in many instances the amount paid by the men seeking to avoid army service is said to have been much larger. Money is no object among the shrinkers. Owing to the labor shortage men have been earning wages in virtually all lines of work which were not even dreamed of before the war. The majority of the cases of efforts to dodge army service by these means according to the medical boards, has been among the poorer class in the East End of London.

In several instances men have injured their health for life in their eagerness to produce symptoms they believed would render them immune from service at the front.

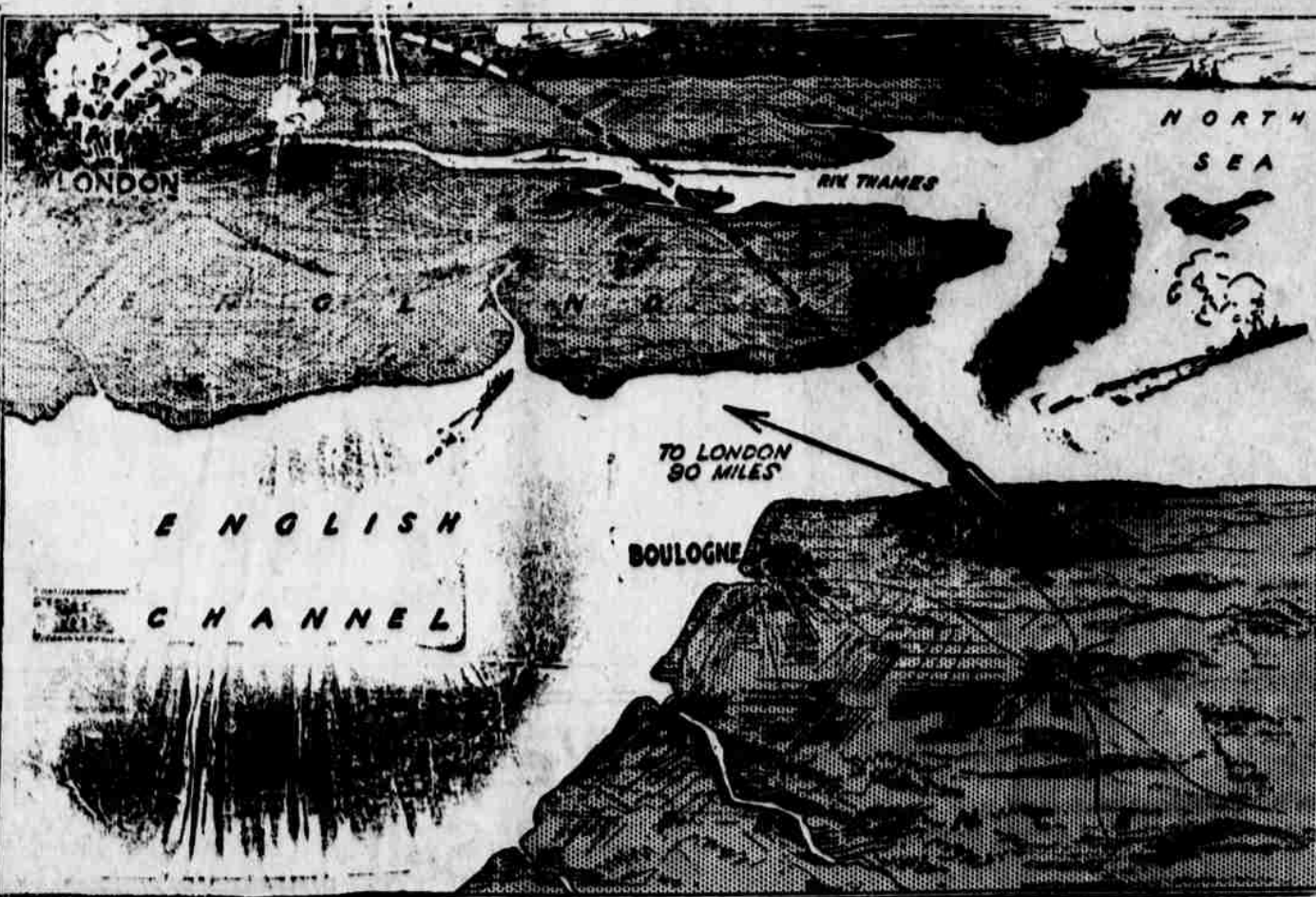
