At the Theaters

Corinne Griffith, beautiful and talented star and chief support of Harry Morey in "Who Goes There?" the Greater Vitagraph Blue Ribbon Feature, which will be the attraction at the Temple Theater today, has "adopted" a discharged bluejacket from the U. S. S. St. Louis. It happened this way:

Miss Griffith was returning to her home in Flatbush from Bay Shore, L. I., when she saw train hands throwing from a car a youth whose appearance bespoke weakness from illness. Her sympathy roused, she interfered, and learned the boy's story. He said he quit the navy on account of ill health and for the same reason was refused enlistment in the army. He obtained work pitching hay on the Sea Air home of a Second avenue employment agent.

The hay he was supposed to pitch proved to be a sea weed and too heavy for him to handle, so he quit and was refused even car fare back to the city, so was beating his way. Miss Griffith paid his fare, gave him a sum of money and promised to "take" him until he recovered his health and got work.

In "Who Goes There?" Miss Griffith is the ward of a German general who leads an invading force into Belgium. She is in London, and a young American, captured by the general, undertakes a perilous mission of bringing her within the Teuton lines. Others in the cast are Arthur Donaldson and Mary Maurice.

As Jacques Labordie, after a tremendous battle with the treacherous currents of the dangerous St. Lawrence river. Mabel Taliaferro drowned in the Metro wonderplay, "The Jury of Fate," as Jeanne Labordie she is saved. Playing both roles in a photoplay that calls for much physical exertion is no easy matter under any circumstances, but had the delightful little star not been an expert swimmer she most certainly would have succumbed to the currents of the St. Lawrence. As Jacques Labordie she is compelled to lie absolutely still in the water while the current sweeps her down upon the rocks. She must be fully dressed even to her boots, and it required remarkable nerve and unquestioned ability as a swimmer for Mabel Taliaferro to undertake the task called to a thrilling successful finish.

Her exciting fight for life as Jeanne is almost as thrilling as is her work as Jacques. Miss Taliaferro was compelled to rest for several days after the water scenes in which she appears were photographed. "The Jury of Fate" will be seen at the Orpheus theater on Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

Casualty List to Date Totals 8634

Washington, D. C., June 25.—Casualties in the American army overseas thus far reported by General Pershing, total 8,634. These are divided in the war department's weekly summary as follows: Killed in action (including 291 lost at sea) 1312. Died of wounds, 432. Died of disease, 1268. Died of accidents and other causes 446. Wounded in action, 4811. Missing in action, including prisoners, 365. Casualties among the marines are not included in this list. No official tabulation of the marine casualties reported to date was available today, but unofficial figures show they are slightly more than 1000.

No Smoke Shortage Thus Far in Sight

Washington, D. C., June 25.—Small danger of a tobacco shortage, despite tremendous amounts being shipped abroad to the army, is shown in a report on the industry by the bureau of the census, disclosing that stocks on hand at the beginning of this year amounted to 1,176,234,657 pounds, an increase of 12.6 per cent over last year. Total production for 1917 was 1,196,451,000 pounds, of which 75 per cent was chewing, smoking, snuff and export types, 19 per cent cigar types and 5 per cent imported types.

HIG DAM MAY CROSS RIO GRANDE RIVER

El Paso, Tex., June 25.—Another reclamation dam may be built across the Rio Grande on both the American and Mexican sides of the river. C. J. Blanchard, statistician of the United States reclamation service, returned here recently from a meeting of Mexican and American land owners at McAllen. The plan is to build a concrete dam across the Rio Grande above McAllen and distribute the flood waters of the Rio Grande over thousands of acres of land on the north and south banks of the river. It will be necessary to obtain a treaty with Mexico before the dam can be constructed.
