**Would Have National  
 Army Reclaim Lands**

Honolulu, T. H., June 13.—(By  
 Mail).—A proposal to use the men  
 of the national army to reclaim vast  
 areas of waste public lands through-  
 out the United States, and to home-  
 stead them, is to be laid before con-  
 gress by Secretary of the Interior  
 Franklin K. Lane, according to a  
 statement by him here yesterday.  
 In connection with the disposition of  
 the public lands of Hawaii.

Secretary Lane arrived in Hono-  
 lulu Saturday, June 8, for the pur-  
 pose of making a thorough investi-  
 gation into the vexed problem of the  
 Territory with a view of finding a  
 solution of the difficulties that have  
 long troubled the islands.  
 "I have a big proposition in mind  
 dealing with the available public  
 lands of the United States, and the  
 public lands of Hawaii may be in-  
 cluded in the general scheme," said  
 Secretary Lane yesterday.

Secretary Lane intends to make  
 a thorough examination of the public  
 lands of Hawaii while he is in the  
 islands. Today, accompanied by  
 Mrs. Lane, Assistant Secretary Brad-  
 ley and Mrs. Bradley, Special Assis-  
 tant and Mrs. Lathrop Brown, his  
 private secretary, Glenn Shafer, Gov-  
 ernor L. E. Pinkham, Governor-  
 Designate C. C. McCarthy, Miss Nan-  
 cy Lane and several local people,  
 Secretary Lane left for a tour of the  
 islands of Hawaii and Maui. He  
 will visit the volcano of Kilauea and  
 the great extinct crater of Hale-  
 kala.

"I want particularly to make my-  
 self as familiar as possible," he said,  
 "as a short visit will permit with  
 the national parks—we have created  
 here without anyone in the depart-  
 ment ever having seen them. We  
 have all the maps and written de-  
 scriptions we need.

"After the war, when we have a  
 merchant marine that will be greater  
 even than England's, with one-half  
 of it devoted to the commerce of the  
 Pacific, our nation is going to realize  
 the significance of the Pacific.  
 It has been hard for America hereto-  
 fore to see anything except the At-  
 lantic, but our vision is widening  
 and we will not only be able to grasp  
 the value of the possibilities that  
 are now before us on this ocean,  
 but we shall have the ships on this  
 great right-of-way, free to us. I  
 think that when this war is over,  
 we shall have the right-of-way, where-  
 ever we want to go."

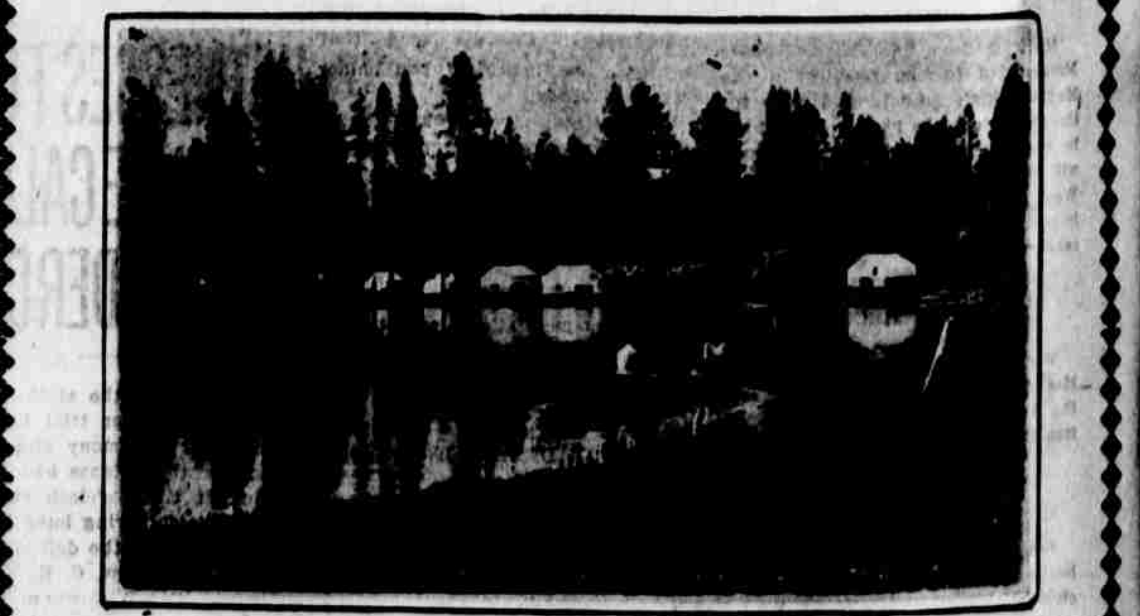
