Hugh Besdeck, now managing the Pittsburgh club of the national league, has been the Oregon coach for a number of years, and is expected back again next fall as soon as the base ball season comes to a close. Besdeck has met with success, one of his achievements being the defeat of the University of Pennsylvania team, which crossed the continent to play at Pasadena on New Year's day, 1917.

The men who practically are assured of returning are Berg, Steers, Wilson, Medley and Hunt, and in this quintet Besdeck will have veteran material around which to build his machine. Medley is the only player subject to the draft.

To date Oregon has six games definitely placed on the 1918 schedule, including pre-season contests with Multnomah Athletic club and Williamette University, or Chemawa during October. The game with the University of Idaho, at Moscow, October 26, will open the conference season for the varsity and will be followed during the succeeding week end by the California battle at Berkeley. Washington State College will come to Eugene for the only game the Oregon fans will have an opportunity to see, on November 16, and for their last game, the Oregonians will journey into the southland to try their luck with the University of California.

Manager Dean Walker still has two open dates on his calendar, November 9 and 23.

Lee Snipes, living at the lower end of the Big Marsh, is cutting hay. The marsh is now dryer than it ever has been and owing to the dry season so far, the grass there is drying up.

Edward Cookman, one of the prominent Indians of the Reservation, is very ill in the Blackburn hospital, having undergone an operation for appendicitis.

Mrs. Henry Hoover, one of the Klamath tribe also, has recovered from an attack of smallpox. She has been quarantined near Modoc Point farm station.

Owing to the cold weather that spring the crops under the Modoc irrigation system are not doing well, and will not yield as much as last year.

A very successful and pleasant social was given at the Modoc Lumber company plant last Saturday, in honor of the boys whom Uncle Sam has called to the colors.

Four cars have been bought on the Reservation recently, by Thomas Long, Geo. Dowell, Arthur Tupper and Warren Skellock.

Edward B. Ashurst, the superintendent of the stock industry of the Klamath Reservation, is busy every day getting ready to receive the stock for which a half million dollars were appropriated by congress last spring.

Although his class in the registration, for some reason, has been changed by the local board from class four K to class one E, nevertheless the Indians hope that the government will not send him away on account of his activities in promoting stock industry on the Reservation.

Joe Ball has been awarded a contract to haul a half million feet of lumber from Lobart station to Modoc Point demonstration farm. The lumber is hauled by rail from Kirk saw mill, and is to be sold to Indians in the Modoc Point district.

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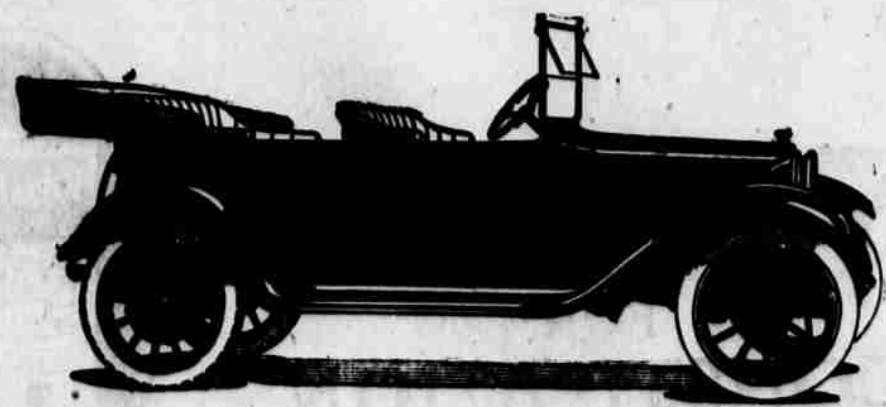
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
