"Price Interpretation" System Being Adopted

Portland, June 29.—A "price interpretation" system, thru which the public will be given full information regarding the cost to retailers of all staple food commodities, together with a suggested price at which such commodities should reasonably be offered for sale by the retailer to the consumer, is now being inaugurated in Oregon. In accordance with a food administration plan which is nation-wide in scope.

Assistant Federal Food Administrator Newell, in announcing the inauguration of the system, said: "The information regarding the cost of important food commodities to the dealer will be secured by price interpretation committee, who will also determine and suggest the reasonable figure at which these staples should be sold to the consumer. It should be remembered that the wholesale dealers are already under license and that their margins of profits are already limited under national food administration regulations. It would

be impossible however, to govern the profits of the retailer this way, because of the varying conditions in different localities, hence the need of the price interpretation system, which will extend to every county in the state. Each county administrator will form a committee, in the personnel of which will be represented every class of retail dealer, and the whole sale or jobbing industry who supplies the retailer, as well as the consumer to whom the retailer sells. The committee will make weekly investigations and give out their schedule of price interpretations thru local newspapers. It should be understood clearly that these prices, however, will not be definite or absolute, but are merely suggestions for prices that will be reasonable for both consumer and dealer at the time, and in the locality where published.
