LAUNDRY DELIVERY SERVICE CHANGES NEXT MONDAY

For all family bundle work, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of each week will constitute regular pick-up days, and Thursday, Friday and Saturday will constitute regular delivery days for the bundles picked up Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Bundles picked up before noon Monday will be delivered Thursday, those received before noon Tuesday will be delivered Friday, and those received up to Wednesday night will be delivered Saturday, except the rough-dry bundles received up to Monday night, which will be delivered Thursday.

We shall be glad to pick up bundles at our convenience on the regular delivery days, but such bundles will not be delivered until the following pick-up day, either Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday, as the case may be.

Any service, other than the above, required of us, we shall be glad to render when possible, but it will be considered a special service and subject to an additional charge of 25 per cent of the total charge.

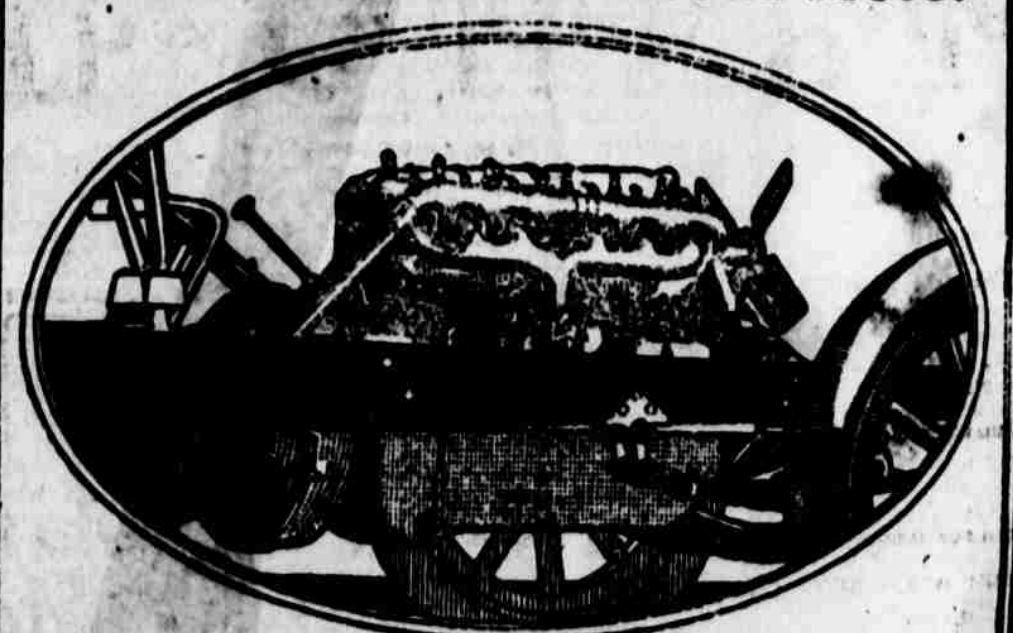
