

Threshermen Must Report On Wheat

Washington, July 2.—Under the authority of the food control act, the bureau of markets of the United States department of agriculture is to require from all threshermen in the country periodical reports on the number of bushels of wheat threshed by them and the acreage from which the grain was produced.

A list of threshermen is being compiled from all available sources by the bureau of crop estimates, which is co-operating in the undertaking. The bureau of markets is having printed a supply of blank forms for threshing reports, together with a pocket memorandum book for daily records. Reports will begin with the opening in June of the winter wheat harvesting season. The county agents will aid in distributing the schedules and memorandum books and will also assist in assembling the results.

The results are to be made available for the use of the United States food administration, the federal trade commission and other branches of the government. They are expected to provide a complete and accurate check on the advance wheat figures of the bureau of crop estimates in the same way that the cotton ginning reports, compiled by the bureau of the census, check cotton estimates.

Annual Report of Klamath Red Cross

Chairman of Klamath County Chapter of This Great Institution Tells of Work and Accomplishments of Year Just Closed. Busy and Successful Year Is Described

I wish to respectfully hand you the following report for and in behalf of myself and the Board of Managers of the Klamath County Chapter of the American Red Cross:

The United States went to war on April 6, 1917. A certain cortege of Klamath Falls people, desiring to aid in the great undertaking, conceived the idea of organizing a Red Cross Chapter, and to this end our application was sent forward on April 24, just 13 days after the declaration of war.

The work was new to all of us and the National expansion of the society was so rapid that confusion and delay at the outset was inevitable. There was so much for us to learn and the letters we wrote for information were so long in being answered, but we are glad to say that is not the case today.

We started our first little drive for members on registration day, June 5, and secured some four hundred—in those days so much explaining was necessary, as the information regarding the Red Cross was very meagre.

With these members as a start, we began work by opening a workroom in the Domestic Science building of the Central School. Shortly after this we deemed it best to secure a workroom on the main street, where it would be more conspicuously located. It was our desire to secure a room as near the center of town as possible, and we interviewed several property owners, but none of them had buildings which they could contribute, and the rents asked ran from \$25 to \$65 per month. At this juncture we interviewed Major Charles E. Worden and he most generously gave us our present quarters free of all rents, whereupon the California-Oregon Power company magnanimously agreed to light it without charge. The building has changed hands, and the present owner has generously allowed this arrangement to continue. Mr. Syd Evans equipped the workroom with sewing machines and a stove, while Mr. Nelson contributed another stove, and Mrs. E. H. Hall loaned a number of chairs. The workroom now fully and completely provided and furnished by the kindness of these parties, was formally opened for "War Relief Work" on July 2, 1917.

Very soon after getting the work room in running order, we were called upon to make our first drive for funds and members. Mr. R. H. Dunbar was appointed to conduct the drive. This was new work to all of us; we worked strenuously and secured some 2500 members and \$9,111.99 in cash, one-fourth of which was retained by Klamath county chapter.

After completing this drive, many entertainments and raffish added materially to our funds.

The surgical dressing department under the leadership of Mrs. C. F. Stone, was opened on December 2. The department has been kept in continual and efficient operation; the shipping of 5,500 surgical dressings from this department has been a gratifying accomplishment and a letter

from headquarters stating that the articles were excellently made shows that they were appreciated. Mrs. Stone also gave a full course of instruction to all desiring to learn how to make surgical dressings. A course in "First Aid" was given to a large class by Dr. A. A. Soule.

Our next expansion came about thru the Christmas drive. Mr. W. O. Smith, having been appointed to manage this campaign, was given a quota of 3,300 members to secure by the state chairman of the drive. He exceeded this quota by 618, securing 3,918 members and collecting \$4,160.04, of which \$2,004.40 went to our local chapter. Besides the above 345 annual subscriptions were secured for the Red Cross magazine.

At this time our endeavors to form auxiliaries in different parts of the county began to bear fruit and today we have the following auxiliaries:
